BILL YUILL

CEO/Governor

Bill Yuill is Chairman and CEO of The Monarch Corporation, a Canadian private equity company with corporate offices in Medicine Hat, Alberta, Canada. The Company has four active divisions related to transportation, real estate, sports properties and investment portfolios.

Since 1977 the sports property division, CSH International Inc., has owned and operated numerous sports franchises in various leagues in both the USA and Canada. Beginning with a franchise in Medicine Hat, Alberta (Pioneer League of Professional Baseball and affiliate of the Oakland 'A's, and then the Toronto Blue Jays), the company expanded to include franchises in Florence, South Carolina (Toronto Blue Jays, A), Ft. Myers Florida (Kansas City Royals, A), Chattanooga, Tennessee (Seattle Mariners, AA), Tucson, Arizona (Houston Astros AAA), Fresno, California (San Francisco Giants, A). The Company then moved on to joining a semi professional basketball league, the World Basketball League, with the Las Vegas Silver Streaks. In 1989, the Company acquired a franchise in the Western Hockey League, the Seattle Thunderbirds and subsequently (2002) moved to establishing an expansion WHL franchise in Everett, Washington (Silvertips). In addition to the Silvertips, the Company has interests in the Peoria Rivermen of the Southern Professional Hockey League and a golf property in Peoria, Arizona.



Bill presently is a Director of two Canadian public companies - Shaw Communications Inc., Calgary, Alberta and The Western Investment Company of Canada, High River, Alberta. He serves as a Director of McKenzie Meadows Golf Club, is a member of the Foundation of St. Andrew's College in Aurora, Ontario and serves as a Governor of the Western Hockey League.

Mr. Yuill received the Milner Fenerty Pinnacle Award in 1995, the Queen Elizabeth Golden Jubilee Medal in 2003 and the Queen Elizabeth Diamond Jubilee Medal in 2013. In 2006 he was awarded an Honorary Doctor of Laws degree from the University of Lethbridge, in 2016 was inducted into The Alberta Order of Excellence, in 2017 was awarded an Honorary Applied Degree from the Medicine Hat College and was inducted into the Calgary Business Hall of Fame in October 2017.

He is a graduate of the Young President's Organization, Alberta Chapter and is a member and past chairman of the World President's Organization, Alberta Chapter.

Bill has been involved in community organizations including the Medicine Hat College Foundation, the Medicine Hat and District United Way and the Medicine Hat Family YMCA. He also served on the Alberta Economic Development Authority.

Bill and his wife, Elizabeth, reside in Medicine Hat, Alberta.

ZORAN RAJCIC

CSH Chief Operating Officer

Zoran Rajcic enters his fourth season as Chief Operating Officer of Consolidated Sports Holdings (CSH) International, Inc, promoted to the position on July 14, 2016 while continuing his timeline as a central member of the Silvertips organization and a leader in the organization's business and hockey operations since the club's admittance into the WHL in 2002.

At the head of a talented front office staff, the Silvertips under his eye earned the 2018-19 WHL Business of the Year award (second in franchise history), back-to-back honors in the Western Conference, and continued to surge at the box office with their largest turnout in eight seasons, surpassing three million fans in downtown Everett and sold out 32 percent of their home games at the 8,149-seat Angel of the Winds Arena. The Silvertips also refined their presence in marketing, broadcasting, social media, and game presentation. He was promoted from Director of Business Operations to Assistant General Manager in October 2011 and added the title of Executive Vice President in July 2012. Helping oversee Silvertips hockey operations, in 2018-19 the Tips captured their fourth U.S. Division title in five seasons, saw a pair of players selected in the NHL Entry Draft, and in 2017-18 earned their second Western Conference championship, with first year head coach Dennis Williams, who set a new franchise record for most wins (47) by a first year head coach and earned the WHL's Western Conference Coach of the Year honor. Silvertips general manager Garry Davidson was the recipient of the Lloyd Saunders Memorial Trophy as WHL Executive of the Year, goaltender Carter Hart earned his second CHL Goaltender of the Year award, and six Silvertips were either drafted by NHL clubs or signed NHL and AHL contracts.

As Rajcic's primary responsibilities revolve around the business and marketing affairs of the club, his direction has helped build a strong community presence throughout Everett and its surrounding communities. As Vice President of Silvertips parent company CSH International, Inc., he also supports the business operations of the other sports franchises within the company.

Hailing from Lethbridge, Alberta, Rajcic is a graduate of the University of Lethbridge with a Bachelor's degree in Management and a major in Marketing. Upon graduation, Rajcic was named the school's Director of Athletic Marketing and was recognized by the National Association of Collegiate Marketing Administrators as the Marketer of the Year in 2000.

Prior to his work in Everett, Rajcic spent three years with the Baton Rouge Kingfish of the ECHL, serving as the Director of Corporate Sales for one season before being promoted to Vice-President/General Manager during his second season.

Zoran and his wife Mirran reside in Everett with their two sons, Jackson, and Aiden.



GARRY DAVIDSON

General Manager

Heading into his eighth full season as the architect of the Everett Silvertips roster, Garry Davidson has built Silvertips hockey into a restored power program of the WHL, routinely in contention and dispatching graduates of the club onto the highest professional ranks. The recipient of the Lloyd Saunders Memorial Trophy as WHL Executive of the Year (2017-18), and reigning back-to-back honoree in the Western Conference, he brought an extensive hockey background with him to Everett when he was named General Manager of the Silvertips in February 2012. In a career spanning more than three decades, Davidson's tenure in hockey includes experience as an owner, general manager, head coach and player personnel director in the junior and professional ranks in both North America and Europe.



Since taking over the Silvertips, Davidson has presided over a building process that has led the franchise to significant strides on the ice with their second Western Conference title in 2017-18 and four U.S. Division titles in the last five seasons, while stocking the club's system with exciting young players and NHL prospects. His eye for talent has covered deep into the WHL Draft, with seven Silvertips players reaching the professional ranks or earning a selection in the NHL Draft after original selection by the Silvertips in rounds 3-8 of the WHL Draft. His constructed roster has evolved into six consecutive winning seasons in franchise history to date, including the team's seventh U.S. Division title with second year head coach Dennis Williams and a record of 258-121-28-21 over the last six regular seasons. Since Davidson assumed control, four Silvertips have been selected in the first or second round of the NHL Entry Draft, five Silvertips have been taken by NHL teams in the last two years, most recently with defenseman Gianni Fairbrother (Montreal) and goaltender Dustin Wolf (Calgary).

Before taking the reins in Everett, Davidson, 68, spent four seasons as Director of Player Personnel for the Portland Winterhawks from 2008-11. In that role he was instrumental of Portland's Bantam Draft selections and scouting of recruited players who helped the program emerge from a last place finish to three straight WHL Finals appearances.

Davidson led the BCHL's Salmon Arm SilverBacks as Owner, General Manager and Head Coach from 2001-08. A three-time BCHL Coach of the Year, his other coaching stops in the league include Penticon, Nanaimo, Victoria and Trail. He also oversaw all player recruiting with each of his BCHL clubs, helping produce eventual Hockey Hall of Fame inductee and Hobey Baker Award recipient Paul Kariya, along with two additional Hobey Baker honorees (Brendan Morrison and Ryan Duncan) and three first-round NHL draft picks (Travis Zajac, Kris Chucko and Riley Nash) with Salmon Arm alone.

Originally from Souris, Manitoba, Davidson's coaching career began in the Manitoba Junior Hockey League in 1978. He then spent eight seasons coaching overseas, where he won an Austrian league championship in 1984 and also spent time in Switzerland and Italy. He returned to North America in 1990 to coach Junior-A in Penticon and was an Assistant Coach for Team Canada's gold medal-winning entry at the 1995 Spengler Cup.

Residing in Everett, Garry and his wife, Brenda, have two sons: Ty, and Clay (mixed martial artist residing in Kelowna, BC).

DENNIS WILLIAMS

Head Coach

Dennis Williams, 40 (8/14/79), enters his third season behind the bench as Silvertips head coach and the engineer of success for the program with a pair of U.S. Division titles, a Western Conference championship, success in the classroom and several Silvertips earning looks for international play and selections in the NHL Entry Draft.

Named the fifth head coach in franchise history on May 15, 2017, Williams promptly embarked on a year-long journey which broke the Silvertips record for wins by a first year head coach (47), earned their third most points (99) in franchise history, set a new single season franchise record for goals (246), were second in the league for goal differential (+80), and earned eight goals or more in a game on five separate occasions. They broke single game franchise records for most goals in a game (11) and largest margin of victory (11) on Dec. 27 in an 11-0 victory at Vancouver, while goaltender Carter Hart earned his second CHL Goaltender of the Year award, and six different Silvertips were drafted by NHL clubs or signed to NHL or AHL contracts. Williams followed with another 47-win and 99-point season, the Silvertips fourth U.S. Division title in five seasons, while goaltender Dustin Wolf was named WHL Western Conference Goaltender of the Year and CHL Scholastic Player of the Year and two more Tips players: defenseman Gianni Fairbrother (Montreal) and Wolf (Calgary) were selected in the NHL Entry Draft. Since Williams took over behind the Silvertips bench, Silvertips goaltenders Dustin Wolf (Hlinka Gretzky Cup, Team USA), Carter Hart (U20 World Junior Championships, Team Canada), and defenseman Ronan Seeley (World U17 Hockey Challenge, Team Canada White) have suited up in international competition.

Additionally serving behind the bench on the international level with Team Canada, this summer at the Hlinka Gretzky Cup and last season for Team Canada Black at the 2018 World Under-17 Hockey Challenge, Williams carries 13 years of head coaching experience across junior and college levels with a combined win percentage of .681 over the last eight seasons as head coach with the Silvertips, Bloomington of the United States Hockey League, and Amarillo of the North American Hockey League. After guiding Bloomington to a 29-24-7 record and fifth place in the Eastern Conference in their expansion season of 2014-15, he led the Thunder in 2015-16 to a 36-18-6 record, an appearance in the Eastern Conference Final, and a victory shy of reaching the league's Clark Cup Finals. He led Amarillo to three consecutive 40-win seasons from 2011-14, amassing a career record of 168-44-2-24 and a points percentage of .756 across four years in the NAHL. He delivered three straight South Division titles, back-to-back and league leading 46-win campaigns, and a Robertson Cup title to Amarillo in 2012-13.

Under Williams, the Bulls shattered a 35-year old record with 99 points in back to back seasons (2011-13) and he was named NAHL Coach of the Year after the Bulls' league championship. Williams' teams in Amarillo led the league in goals from 2011-13, and finished second in the NAHL with 207 goals with a +87 goal differential in 2013-14.

During his time in Amarillo and Bloomington, he helped 74 players advance to play in the NCAA Division-I ranks, and with the Bulls coached seven division All-Conference selections, two All-NAHL First Team members, one defenseman of the year, and one division All-Rookie honoree. With the Thunder, a total of 12 selections were either chosen for the NHL Entry Draft, and for rosters at the U17 Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament, U18 World Championships, and the Junior A World Challenge. He assisted with community outreach efforts with every one of his Bulls squads containing a community service award recipient, and his team in Bloomington was selected as recipient of the 2016-17 Curt Hammer Community Service Award.

The native of Stratford, Ontario has served Utica College and University of Alabama-Huntsville as assistant coach and started his head coaching career at the NCAA level with four seasons serving Neumann College and Bowling Green State University. both in head coach and assistant coach positions. The former right winger received his bachelors and masters degrees from Bowling Green, finishing with 117 career games, 20 points (12 goals, 8 assists), and 198 penalty minutes for the Falcons.

Dennis and his wife, Hollie, live in Lake Stevens and have two daughters, Emerson and Elyse.



LOUIS MASS

Assistant Coach

Louis Mass enters his second season as Silvertips assistant coach, handling development of the program's defensemen who stifled WHL opponents last season with a 1.9 goals-against-average, also lowest in the entire Canadian Hockey League while holding opponents to 26.9 shots per game, second lowest in the WHL.

Making an instant impact on the Silvertips blueline, Mass helped three Silvertips defensemen – Gianni Fairbrother, Wyattte Wylie, and Jake Christiansen – reach the double-digit plateau in goals while Fairbrother (Montreal, NHL Draft selection) and Christiansen (St. Louis, development camp invite) joined Wylie as Tips defensemen who earned notable NHL attention over the course of one year. After the completion of his first WHL season, 2002-born defenseman Ronan Seeley also earned an invite to Team Canada's U-18 selection camp, in preparation for the 2019 Hlinka Gretzky Cup.



After serving as assistant coach of the University of Alaska-Anchorage (NCAA) for three seasons (2015-18) and helping promote eight Seawolves onto the pro ranks in the last three years. The native of Anchorage, Alaska previously spent 13-plus seasons as a player or coach at the professional level with the Alaska Aces, Louisiana IceGators, Pee Dee Pride, and Pensacola Ice Pilots of the ECHL, and as a player or coach helped guide the Aces to three Kelly Cup championships.

Mass, 42 (Oct. 17, 1976), served behind the Aces bench for eight seasons (2007-15) in assistant coach, director of player development, and strength and conditioning roles under head coaches Keith McCambridge, Brent Thompson, and Rob Murray, helping guide the Aces as a coach to a pair of Kelly Cup titles in 2011 and 2014 and three trips to the Kelly Cup Finals. During a span ranging in four of six seasons (2008-14) with Mass on their coaching staff, the Aces led the entire league in fewest goals against per game, and were second in the ECHL (2.3) in 2012-13, when they captured their third straight Brabham Cup for the top regular season record in the league at 106 points, most in the ECHL since 2007-08. During Mass' eight-year tenure behind their bench, the Aces helped promote 69 players to the American Hockey League level, including former Silvertips forwards John Lammers and Chris Langkow. Four players during that span were named to the ECHL All-Rookie Team, and 12 players were named First or Second Team ECHL All-Stars.

Mass spent five-plus seasons as a defenseman in the ECHL with Alaska, Louisiana, Pee Dee, and Pensacola. He was a part of the 2005-06 Aces team that earned their first Kelly Cup title in franchise history and cruised to the Brabham Cup title with 113 points and a 53-12-7 record, alongside Silvertips alumnus and forward Alex Leavitt (who led the league with 91 points in 72 games). The 6-foot-4, 215 pound former blueliner skated for four seasons at Bowling Green State Univ. (NCAA) where he was a four-year teammate with Tips head coach Dennis Williams and served as assistant captain of the program as a 2000-01 senior.

Mass, who splits his residence between Everett and Anchorage, is also an owner of Elite Sports Performance, the premier strength and conditioning and skill development facility for athletes in Alaska. He has also served in youth hockey on the board of directors and as a coach with the Anchorage Hockey Association and with USA Hockey as a Coaching Education staff member.

MIKE LYSYJ

Assistant Coach

Mike Lysyj enters his first season as assistant coach with the Everett Silvertips, joining the franchise after spending last season on the bench as assistant coach for Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute (NCAA), serving with skill development on and off the ice under head coach Dave Smith, and assistant coaches Dan Jewell and Chuck Weber.

Last season, the native of Hillsborough, N.J. helped guide R.P.I. to a victory over No. 9-ranked Cornell, while the Engineers last season elevated goaltender Owen Savory to a spot on the ECAC All-Rookie Team as a Finalist for Rookie of the Year. Additionally, Hobey Baker nominee Jacob Hayhurst (23 points), Pittsburgh Penguins prospect Will Reilly (18 points), and Ottawa Senators prospect Todd Burgess (16 points) each secured offensive career highs.

Previously, Lysyj, 30 (11/30/1988), spent four years as assistant coach at SUNY Fredonia (NCAA), where he responsible for recruiting and scouting across the United States and Canada, and assisted with film breakdown, on-ice skill development, and hockey operations administration. In 2017-18, he helped guide the Blue Devils to a 9-3-3 mark on home ice and an appearance in the SUNYAC title game for the first time in seven years, upsetting national powers Plattsburgh State and Oswego in the conference tournament.

Carrying additional experience as an instructor with USA Hockey's New England District, a USA Hockey Festival Evaluator (Atlantic & Southeast District), and with Pro Ambitions Inc. in Dedham, Mass., the former forward made his pro debut with an assist in six games with the Orlando Solar Bears (ECHL) in 2012-13 and recorded 29 games split between Peoria and Mississippi (SPHL) in 2013-14. Lysyj spent all four seasons of his collegiate career with SUNY Cortland, registering 77 points (39g-38a) in 96 games and led the Red Dragons with 33 points (18g-15a) in 25 games as a 2012-13 senior.

At SUNY Cortland, Lysyj graduated with his B.A. degree in Kinesiology (coaching concentration) in 2013 and earned his M.S. degree in Sports Management & Exercise Science in 2017.

Lysyj will reside in North Everett during the season.



JAMES STUCKY

Equipment Manager

James Stucky has served as the Silvertips' Equipment Manager since the inception of the franchise in 2003. A native of Burien, Washington, he got involved in hockey at a young age as a stick boy and has now spent 20 years in the game as an equipment manager at the minor-pro and Major Junior levels. MEDIA GUIDELINES

- ACCESS:
The Everett Silvertips organization and Media Relations Department strive to make its players, coaches, management and other personnel available in a timely and responsible fashion to all accredited members of the media.
- CREDENTIALS:
Approval for single-game access will be granted by e-mail, to Mike Benton at mbenton@everettsilvertips.com and are asked to request no later than 24 hours prior to game day. While single-game access will be granted to accredited terrestrial and digital media members, it is requested that individuals working on a freelance assignment provide confirmation (by e-mail or fax) from the associated outlet's editor-in-chief or department director, either on company letterhead or by company e-mail. Media members working on a single-game basis are asked to enter Angel of the Winds (AOTW) Arena and check in through its loading dock gate, located off Broadway. **Reserved parking inside the loading dock is available on an extremely limited basis and must you request by e-mail in advance, to the address above.**
- PRESS BOX AND PRESS ROOM:
The Everett Silvertips press box is located on the team bench side of AOTW Arena, above sections 218-219. The press box is accessible by elevator, via "level 3" and provides complimentary WiFi internet access. Media members will be assigned to a seat above section 218 (located between the venue's broadcast booths) or atop section 217, to the left of the Silvertips broadcast booth. The Silvertips press room is located on the bottom level, penalty box side of XFINITY Arena, located in the "Green Room." A complimentary meal, coffee, water, and press notes will be provided in the press room beginning usually two hours before game time. Updated lineups and scratches are made available typically an hour before puck drop, and will be available both in the press box and press room.
- NON-GAME DAY PRACTICE LOCATIONS:
On non-game days, the Silvertips almost exclusively practice at AOTW Arena. The Silvertips will skate, on rare occasion, inside the venue's Community Ice Rink, located adjacent to AOTW Arena. All media are required to enter AOTW Arena through the front entrance of the Silvertips offices, located off Hewitt Ave. Morning skates held in AOTW Arena are closed to the public and are only available for access to previously credentialed media, or for assignment requests by e-mailing the Silvertips media relations department at

- mbenton@everettsilvertips.com. Visiting teams may skate at AOTW Arena or the Community Ice Rink, depending on availability of AOTW Arena. Please contact the assigned media relations personnel of each team to confirm their skate times/availability.
- **MORNING SKATE MEDIA ACCESS:**
The Silvertips, on most mornings, will have limited player availability (non high-school age) for morning skate sessions starting at approximately 10:15 a.m. Typically, a team meeting follows and players are available at the conclusion of the meeting (approximately between Noon and 1:00 p.m.). If there are specific players you need to speak with, we ask that you arrive at AOTW Arena no later than Noon so we can ensure player availability upon the completion of the morning's activities.
- **PREGAME MEDIA ACCESS:**
Silvertips players (exception: starting goaltender, at player's discretion) and coaches are available on a limited basis before game time and on advance request to national television rights holders and club radio broadcasts. Head coach Dennis Williams has a window of availability between 60-75 minutes before puck drop. Players and assistant coaches will be available between 90 minutes to 2.5 hours before puck drop and media members who wish to utilize this media access window MUST contact the Silvertips Media Relations Department, minimum one day in advance, with their interview requests.
- **POST-GAME MEDIA ACCESS:**
The Silvertips conduct post-game interviews on all occasions outside their dressing room, with the media availability window opening after a 10-minute "cooling off" period. Due to the elevated and sensitive work environment for coaches and staff, the Silvertips dressing room is strictly off limits at all times. The club's logo media backdrop, located 40 feet to the right of the Silvertips dressing room, is the encouraged interview location to prevent obstruction of team and club staff, utilizing the hallways as a work environment. Media requesting players and coaches are required to inform Silvertips media relations staff, assisting at the dressing room entrance. It is strongly encouraged that all non-game related and "one-on-one" interview requests be scheduled for a non-game day, and submitted in advance to mbenton@everettsilvertips.com. Depending on the nature of their treatment, players receiving medical treatment may or may not necessarily be available during postgame access.

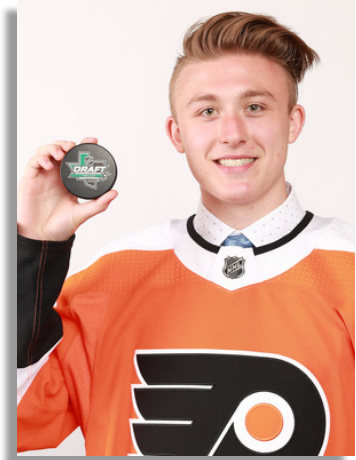

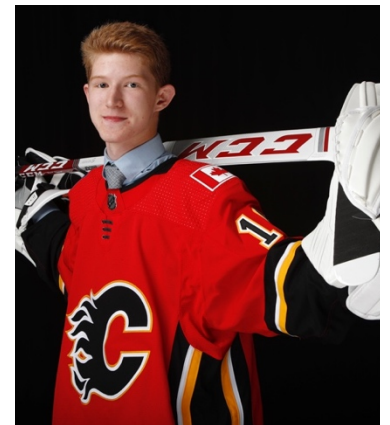

2003-04 SEASON

The Everett Silvertips inaugural season in 2003-2004 captured the hearts of the entire Everett and Snohomish County communities. In their first-ever season in the Western Hockey League, the Silvertips broke many expansion records in the regular season and enjoyed a playoff run that will never be forgotten by Silvertip fans as the Kevin Constantine-led hockey club scratched and clawed its way to the 2004 WHL Finals.

2003-2004 REGULAR SEASON LEADERS

John Dahl (25 goals, 19 assists) and Riley Armstrong (18 goals, 26 assists) finished the 2003-2004 season tied as the Silvertips' leading scorers with 44 points each. Dahl led the hockey club with 25 goals and Armstrong led the Silvertips with 26 assists. Mitch Love (12 goals, 15 assists) led all Silvertips defensemen in scoring with 27 points and led the club in penalty minutes with 163. Forward Curtis Billsten (8 goals, 12 assists) led the Silvertips in plus/minus rating with a +14 and led the team in rookie scoring with 20 points.

Goaltender Jeff Harvey was solid between the pipes, posting a 24-15-5 record with a 1.97 goals-against average (2nd in WHL), .926 saves percentage (3rd in WHL) and 3 shutouts. Michael Wall, who was acquired in a trade with the Prince George Cougars in October, made a nice contribution with 12 victories, a 2.27 goals-against average (5th in WHL), .920 saves percentage (7th in WHL) and 2 shutouts.

2003-2004 REGULAR SEASON SPECIAL TEAMS

The Silvertips finished 18th in the WHL on the power play (56 for 416, 13.5%) and 2nd in the WHL on the penalty kill (255 for 285, 89.5%). The Silvertips allowed the fewest power play goals in the WHL with 30 power play goals against.

RECORD BREAKERS

The Everett Silvertips broke many WHL and CHL expansion team records in their dream first season. Overall the Silvertips broke 10 expansion team records during the 2003-2004 season.

THE 2004 WHL PLAYOFFS

The Everett Silvertips put together a fantastic run through the 2004 WHL Playoffs. The Silvertips swept the Spokane Chiefs 4-0 in the first round and defeated their rivals north of the border, the Vancouver Giants, in six games (4-2) in the Western Conference Semifinals. The Silvertips then battled the defending WHL Champion Kelowna Rockets in the Western Conference Finals and found themselves down 3-1 in the series heading into a must-win Game 5 in Kelowna, BC. The comeback started on an overtime goal by Bryan Nathe in Game 5 that sent the series back to Everett for Game 6. The Everett Events Center was rocking for Game 6, and the Silvertips did not disappoint as John Dahl tallied the game-winning overtime goal to even the series at three games apiece and force a deciding Game 7 in Kelowna. On Tuesday, April 27, 2004 the Silvertips defeated the Kelowna Rockets 2-1 in overtime to win the Western Conference Championship and a trip to the 2004 WHL Finals. Jeff Schmidt tallied the biggest goal in franchise history in overtime and goaltender Jeff Harvey made 35 saves to help lead the 'Tips to the record-breaking victory. Everett faced off against the high-powered offense of the Medicine Hat Tigers in the WHL Finals. The Tigers won the Championship series in four games, but the Silvertips showed that Everett would be a force in the Western Hockey League for years to come.

2004 PLAYOFF SCORING LEADERS

The Silvertips were led in scoring by John Dahl (3 goals, 13 assists) in the 2004 WHL Playoffs with 16 points. Marc Desloges (7 goals, 5 assists) led the hockey club in goals with 7 and Dahl led the team in assists with 13. Ivan Baranka (3 goals, 5 assists), Bryan Nathe (2 goals, 6 assists) and Mitch Love (2 goals, 6 assists) led Silvertips defensemen with eight points each. Forward Mark Kress led the team with a +11 rating. In goal, Jeff Harvey finished the postseason with 11 victories, a 1.86 goals-against average, .938 saves percentage and 3 shutouts to finish off his stellar WHL career.

...AND THE CROWD GOES WILD AT THE EVERETT EVENTS CENTER

Between 36 home regular season and 10 home playoff games, the Everett Events Center attracted over 275,000 fans for Silvertips hockey games in 2003-04. During the 2004 WHL Playoffs the Silvertips averaged over 7,100 fans at the Everett Events Center.

2004-05 SEASON

SILVERTIPS ENJOY A SUCCESSFUL SECOND SEASON

Everett finished its second season in the Western Hockey League with a tough second-round loss to the Kootenay Ice in the 2005 WHL playoffs, but the future definitely looked bright for the 'Tips in the years to come. In the 2004-2005 campaign the Silvertips finished the regular season with 33 victories and their second-straight playoff berth in their second year of existence in the WHL. The hard-working Silvertips won an

exciting seven-game first-round series against the U.S. Division-rival Portland Winterhawks and played a very competitive series against the Kootenay Ice in the second round of the playoffs.

A SALUTE TO THE FANS

A total of 255,441 fans flocked to the Everett Events Center in the 2004-2005 season to watch the excitement of Silvertips hockey. Overall the Silvertips averaged more than 6,200 fans in 36 regular season home games and five home playoff games, making the Everett Events Center the loudest and most special atmosphere in the Western Hockey League. The 'Tips finished the regular season with 20 home wins at the EEC, narrowly topping the 19 home victories the club posted during its inaugural year.

Alex Leavitt finished the season as the top Silvertips' scorer with 16 goals and 46 assists for 62 points. Leavitt's team-leading 46 assists also ranked him 10th in the WHL. Torrie Wheat led the 'Tips with 25 goals and ended the season tied for eighth in the WHL with 14 power play goals. Wheat also finished second on the team in scoring with 57 points. Shaun Heshka led all Silvertips defensemen in scoring with 12 goals and 26 assists for 38 points. Rookie forward Zach Hamill (8 goals, 25 assists) ended his season fourth on the hockey club in scoring with 33 points. Hamill also finished eighth in WHL rookie scoring and first in scoring among 16-year-olds. Forwards Brady Calla and Tyler Dietrich led the Silvertips with a +6 rating. In goal the Silvertips were led by Michael Wall and Leland Irving. Wall finished fifth in the WHL in goals-against average (1.92), third in saves percentage (.931), second in shutouts (10) and eighth in wins (24). Fellow netminder Leland Irving finished his rookie season with solid numbers, posting a 9-8-1 record with a 1.80 goals-against average and a .930 saves percentage.

REGULAR SEASON SPECIAL TEAMS

The Silvertips finished the regular season ninth in the WHL on the power play (69 for 383, 18.0%) and first in the entire CHL on the penalty kill (245 for 276, 88.8%).

PLAYOFF SCORING LEADERS

Alex Leavitt led the Silvertips in playoff scoring with 11 points (6 goals, 5 assists). Mark Kress finished second in playoff scoring with 6 points (2 goals, 4 assists) and Zach Hamill finished third with 5 points (2 goals, 3 assists). Ivan Baranka led all Silvertips defensemen with 4 points (3 goals, 1 assist) in the postseason. Defenseman Randy King led the Silvertips in plus/minus with a +3 rating.

THE FUTURE IS BRIGHT

The Silvertips iced a roster featuring more 16-year-olds than any other team in the WHL in 2004-05. Eight players from Everett's 2003 bantam draft class made major contributions. Zach Hamill (1st round/3rd overall) played 57 regular season games and all 11 playoff games. The Port Coquitlam, BC native finished eighth in the WHL in rookie scoring and was the top 16-year-old scorer in the league on his way to being named Silvertips Rookie of the Year. Defenseman Taylor Ellington (3rd round/41st overall) played 47 regular season games and 8 playoff games this season. The 6-1, 195-pound defenseman was named Silvertips Most Improved Player at the end of the regular season. Brady Calla (4th round/61st overall) played 68 regular season games and 11 playoff games. The Kelowna, BC native finished the season with 21 points (11 goals, 10 assists). Goaltender Leland Irving (5th round/81st overall) was very solid between the pipes his rookie season, playing 23 games. Irving finished with a 1.81 goals-against average and a .931 saves percentage. Graham Potuer (9th round/161st overall) played 29 regular season games and 5 playoff games. The Red Deer, Alberta native finished with a goal and an assist in his first season on defense. Zach Sim (10th round/181st overall) started the season with Everett in January and played 28 regular season games and 10 playoff games. Sim finished with 3 goals in his rookie season. Arborg, Manitoba native Brennan Zasitko (11th round/201st overall) played 28 regular season games and 7 playoff contests. Zasitko picked up 3 assists during the regular season. Jonathan Harty (12th round/221st overall) played 58 games during the regular season and all 11 playoff games. Harty finished his rookie year with 11 points (2 goals and 9 assists) as a defenseman and forward. In total the Silvertips 16-year-olds played a combined 338 regular season games and 63 playoff contests.

A FOND FAREWELL TO LOVE, LEAVITT AND DIETRICH

The Everett Silvertips said goodbye to captain Mitch Love and forwards Alex Leavitt and Tyler Dietrich, who moved on to the next level of their careers after 2004-05. Love played over 300 games in his successful WHL career and tallied a total of 99 regular season points and 11 points in the playoffs. Tyler Dietrich played 72 games for the Silvertips in his two years with the club. In those two seasons with the 'Tips, Dietrich tallied a total of 46 points (19 goals, 27 assists) and finished with 78 points in his WHL career. The Silvertips acquired Alex Leavitt in a trade with the Swift Current Broncos in early November of 2004. Leavitt finished the regular season with 48 points as a Silvertip and led the team in playoff scoring. The Edmonton, Alberta native finished with 43 goals and 87 assists in 135 regular season games during his short but successful WHL career.

2005-06 SEASON

The young Everett Silvertips organization put forth another impressive season in 2005-06. The 'Tips set numerous franchise records in their third year of existence and enjoyed another solid run in the WHL playoffs, advancing to the Western Conference Finals for the second time. Everett was held out of another appearance in the league finals by the rival Vancouver Giants, but the Silvertips again exceeded expectations to reach the WHL's final four for the second time in three seasons.

SILVERTIPS BREAK TEAM AND INDIVIDUAL FRANCHISE RECORDS

Throughout the 2005-2006 season

the Silvertips broke numerous team and individual franchise records. As a group, the Silvertips broke franchise single-season records for wins (40), points earned (85), home victories (25), goals scored (203), power play goals (81) and shorthanded goals (13). Individually, John Lammers tallied the most goals (38) and most points (75) of any Silvertips player in a season. Shaun Heshka set a new team record for most assists in a season with 49, while goaltender Leland Irving set single-season franchise records in wins (37), saves (1504), games played (67), and goals-against average (1.92). The Silvertips also recorded the most hat tricks in the WHL with ten, with Peter Mueller and John Lammers tallying three apiece to lead the way. Torrie Wheat added a pair of three-goal nights, while Ondrej Fiala and Zach Hamill recorded one hat trick each. Of the ten hat tricks, five were "natural hat tricks", with one player scoring three straight times for Everett.

FASTEST TO 100 WINS

In their first three seasons in the WHL the Silvertips recorded 108 wins, 82 losses, 17 ties, 6 overtime losses and 3 shootout losses in 216 regular season games. The Silvertips became the fastest expansion team in modern WHL history to reach 100 wins when they accomplished the feat with a 4-2 home victory over the rival Seattle Thunderbirds on February 14, 2006.

SILVERTIPS LEADING SCORERS IN 2005-2006 REGULAR SEASON

John Lammers (38 goals, 37 assists) led the Silvertips in scoring with 75 points in 2005-06. The Langley, BC native also paced the 'Tips with 38 goals, 16 power play goals, four shorthanded goals and tied for first with six game-winning goals. Forward Zach Hamill (21 goals, 38 assists) and defenseman Shaun Heshka (10 goals, 49 assists) finished tied for second on the team in scoring with 59 points each. Hamill led the team in plus/minus rating at +18, while Heshka led the club with 49 assists. First-year forward Peter Mueller (26 goals, 32 assists) led all Silvertips rookies in scoring with 58 points on his way to being named the WHL's 2006 Rookie of the Year. The Bloomington, Minnesota native also finished second on the club with 26 goals. In goal, Leland Irving posted 37 victories and recorded a 1.92 goals-against average, .926 saves percentage and four shutouts.

2006 SILVERTIPS PLAYOFF SCORING LEADERS

Silvertips forward Zach Hamill (3 goals, 11 assists) led the Silvertips in playoff scoring with 14 points. The Port Coquitlam, BC native also led the team in assists. Shaun Heshka (3 goals, 10 assists) and Peter Mueller (7 goals, 6 assists) finished tied for second on the team in playoff scoring with 13 points. Mueller also led the Silvertips in goals scored with seven. Defenseman Taylor Ellington (1 goal, 2 assists) finished in the top spot on the hockey club with a +6 rating. In goal, Leland Irving recorded eight wins, a 1.69 GAA, .938 SV% and three shutouts during the playoffs. Goaltender Matt Esposito relieved Irving during his injury and compiled a 3.41 GAA and a .873 SV%.

LONGEST GAME IN SILVERTIPS HISTORY

Game 5 of the Silvertips' second-round playoff series against Kelowna on Friday, April 14 marked the longest game in franchise history. The Rockets defeated the Silvertips 3-2 in double overtime in the contest, which lasted a total of 87 minutes and 50 seconds.

WALL GETS THE NHL CALL

Goaltender Michael Wall became the first former Silvertip to suit-up in the NHL when the Anaheim Mighty Ducks called him up from the Portland Pirates (AHL) on October 20, 2005. Wall did not appear in a game, but dressed as the Ducks' backup goaltender. Wall played in 91 games for the Silvertips from 2003-2005, finishing among the WHL leaders in goals-against average (1.92), saves percentage (.931), wins (24) and shutouts (10) in 2004-05.

THANK YOU TORRIE, SHAUN AND MARK

The Silvertips said goodbye to 20-year-olds Torrie Wheat, Shaun Heshka and Mark Kress after three years of hard work and dedication following the 2005-06 season. Wheat ended his WHL career as the all-time leading scorer in Silvertips history with 126 points. The Nanaimo, BC native played 174 games for Everett, recording 49 goals and 77 assists from 2003-2006. Wheat's 49 goals and 30 power play goals ranked him first in franchise history in both of those categories as well. Defenseman Shaun Heshka finished his career second on the Silvertips scoring list with 107 points. The Melville, SK native played his entire WHL career with Everett, setting a franchise record through three seasons with 204 games played. Heshka was also the Silvertips' career leader in assists at the time with 82. Mark Kress finished his Silvertips career with 171 career games played over three seasons. The Regina, SK native had 16 goals and 19 assists for 35 points in his three years with the club.

YOU'RE IN SILVERTIP COUNTRY

2006-07 SEASON

The Everett Silvertips were a force to be reckoned with in 2006-07, winning their third U.S. Division title in four years and earning the Scotty Munro Trophy with the best record in the WHL (54-15-1-2, 111 points) during the regular season. Although the 'Tips suffered a disappointing playoff loss to the Prince George Cougars in the Western Conference Semifinals, there was still much to celebrate after the fourth season of Silvertips hockey. The club averaged over 6,400 fans per game in the regular season and nearly 6,800 in the 2007 playoffs while seeing a total of over 272,000 hockey fans attend Silvertips games at the Everett Events Center.

SILVERTIPS BREAK SINGLE SEASON FRANCHISE RECORDS

Not surprisingly, the 2006-2007 Silvertips smashed several franchise



records on their way to the WHL's Regular Season Championship. Everett set single-season franchise records for wins (54), points (111), goals scored (239), goals allowed (142) and shutouts (14) that still stand today. Their 142 goals allowed was the lowest total in the WHL and ranked fourth all-time in league history. The 14 shutouts recorded by the Silvertips tied the WHL shutout record held by the 2003-04 Kelowna Rockets and the 2004-05 Seattle Thunderbirds. Several Silvertips recorded individual single-season franchise records during the 2006-2007 campaign as well. Zach Hamill broke team marks for assists (61) and points (93), while goaltender Leland Irving established new records for goals-against average (1.86) and shutouts (11) in a single season.

ZACH HAMILL WINS WHL SCORING TITLE

Forward Zach Hamill enjoyed the most impressive offensive season in Silvertips history in 2006-07, capturing the Bob Clarke Trophy as the WHL's top scorer. Hamill, an 18-year-old product of Port Coquitlam, BC, tallied 32 goals and a league-leading 61 assists for 93 points in 69 games to become the first Silvertip to win the WHL scoring title. The 5'11", 190-pound center ranked third in the league in points-per-game (1.37) and enjoyed the longest point streak in the WHL (15 games). Hamill's outstanding season also included being named the Husky WHL Player of the Month for January and the Boston Pizza WHL Player of the Week for the week of January 22nd – 28th.

KYLE BEACH WINS WHL ROOKIE OF THE YEAR

Forward Kyle Beach was honored as the 2007 recipient of the Jim Piggott Trophy, awarded to the WHL's Rookie of the Year. He became the second consecutive Silvertip to win the award after Peter Mueller took home Rookie of the Year honors in 2006. Beach had a phenomenal rookie season, leading all WHL 16-year-olds in scoring with 29 goals and 32 assists for 61 points in 65 games. The Kelowna, BC native finished first among all rookies in plus/minus rating (+27), second in power play goals (18) and tied for second in game-winning goals (6) during the 2006-2007 regular season. He also led the Silvertips in plus/minus and game-winning goals while finishing third on team in goals.

2006-2007 SILVERTIPS REGULAR SEASON LEADING SCORERS

Forward Zach Hamill (32 goals, 61 assists) led the team in scoring with 93 points, while Peter Mueller (21 goals, 57 assists) finished second with 78 points. Kyle Beach (29 goals, 32 assists) finished third on the team with 61 points. Hamill led the Silvertips in assists (61) while Moises Gutierrez led the team with 35 goals and 24 power play goals and Beach led the way with a +27 plus/minus rating. In goal, Leland Irving posted 34 wins, a 1.86 goals-against average, .929 saves percentage and 11 shutouts. David Reekie finished 20-6 with the Silvertips and posted a 1.77 GAA, .925 SV% and three shutouts.

SILVERTIPS 2007 PLAYOFF SCORING LEADERS

Forward Peter Mueller led the Silvertips in playoff scoring with seven goals, nine assists and 16 points. Moises Gutierrez (5 goals, 6 assists) and Kyle Beach (5 goals, 6 assists) finished tied for second on the club with 11 points each. Goaltender Leland Irving finished 6-4-1 in the postseason with a 2.82 GAA and an 88.7 SV%.

THANK YOU JASON, JESSE AND MOISES

The Everett Silvertips organization bid a fond farewell to the three Silvertips overagers that ended their WHL career in 2006-07. The Silvertips thanked defensemen Jason Fransoo and Jesse Zetariuk and forward Moises Gutierrez for their hard work and dedication on and off the ice. Fransoo finished his Silvertips career playing 143 regular season and 27 playoff games in his two seasons with the club. The North Battleford, SK native won back-to-back Silvertips Ironman Awards and was named a Second-Team Western Conference All-Star after the 2006-2007 regular season. In his WHL career with Swift Current and Everett, Fransoo recorded 15 goals and 67 assists in 259 regular season games. Zetariuk was acquired by Everett in a trade with Moose Jaw in December 2006. The Brandon, MB native was named an Assistant Captain by the Silvertips in January and posted a goal and 6 assists in 40 games with Everett. Zetariuk was also a +11 during the regular season with the Silvertips. In his WHL career with the Red Deer Rebels, Moose Jaw Warriors and the Everett Silvertips, Zetariuk played in 297 career WHL regular season games and tallied 16 goals with 64 assists for 80 points. Gutierrez was acquired by the Silvertips in a trade with Kamloops in the summer of 2006. The Anchorage, AK native led the Silvertips with 35 goals in his lone season with the club. In his 326-game WHL career with Kamloops and Everett, Gutierrez posted 68 goals and 73 assists for 141 points.

2007-08 SEASON

HOTTEST TICKET IN TOWN

The Everett Silvertips remained successful both on and off the ice in 2007-08, as the club finished with a winning record for the fifth consecutive year while drawing over 230,000 fans. Through five years in Everett, the 'Tips welcomed over 1.3 million fans into Comcast Arena while compiling 201 wins as they proved to be the archetypal franchise in the Western Hockey League. The on-ice success transferred to the box office, as Everett averaged 6,424 fans per game and finished with over 230,000 total fans for the fifth consecutive season. The Silvertips sold their one millionth ticket in March 2007, prior to the team's 141st regular season game (including regular season and playoffs).

After a franchise-record eight sellouts in 07-08, the Silvertips had sold out the 8,149 seat Comcast Arena 26 times in club history.

IRVING TIES WHL SHUTOUT RECORD

Leland Irving stopped all 37 shots he faced in a 2-0 blanking of Seattle on February 29th at Comcast Arena, earning his 21st career shutout to tie him with former Thunderbird and Kootenay Ice goaltender Bryan Bridges for the most career shutouts in WHL history at the time (the mark was surpassed by Vancouver's Tyson Sexsmith in 2009). Irving shutout Seattle and Spokane four separate times, while also posting three shutouts against Portland and Tri-City. He also shut out Kamloops, Chilliwack, Swift Current, Kootenay, Vancouver, Prince George and Kelowna once each in his career. In addition to his 21 career regular season shutouts, he also posted clean slates in the postseason against Tri-City (twice) and Kelowna. A first round NHL draft pick (26th overall) of the Calgary Flames in 2006, Irving recorded his 100th career victory with 22 saves in a 4-2 home win against Spokane on January 19th, 2008. In 195 career WHL games, Irving finished with a 107-62-3-8 record, a 2.05 GAA and a .925 saves percentage. He recorded his 100th career victory in a 4-2 win at home against Spokane on January 19th, 2008, by stopping 22 of 24 shots.

KYLE BEACH EMERGES AS A LOTTERY PICK

When the Silvertips selected Kelowna, BC product Kyle Beach with the tenth overall pick in the 2005 WHL Bantam Draft, they knew they would be receiving a skilled forward who had great potential. What they didn't foresee was that they had selected a player who would become the 11th overall pick of the Chicago Blackhawks in the 2008 NHL Entry Draft. Beach, who took home the Jim Piggott Memorial Trophy as the league's top rookie in 2007, streaked out of the gate and remained among league leaders in points, goals and power play goals for much of the first half of the 07-08 season. Though his statistics cooled slightly in the second half thanks in part to a string of nagging injuries, Beach still played in 60 of the team's 72 games and continued to exhibit his power forward nature. His scoring flair and creativity were exhibited with two unbelievable highlight-reel "lacrosse-style" goals (10/3/07 vs Spokane; 11/1/07 @ Edmonton) in which he picked the puck up on the blade of his stick and whipped it into the upper reaches of the net from behind the goal.

REGULAR SEASON LEADING SCORERS

Though Kyle Beach and Zach Hamill may have drawn more headlines throughout their junior careers, it was overage forward Dan Gendur that made the loudest statement in 2007-08, turning in career highs with 60 games played, 29 goals, 55 assists, and 84 points. The 55 assists and 84 points more than doubled his previous career highs as the Vancouver Canucks' seventh round draft pick contributed his best hockey since being acquired from Prince George in November 2006. Hamill entered the season with the pressure of building off his 2006-07 season, when he took home the Bob Clarke Trophy as the WHL's leading scorer with 93 points. Though the point total was not replicated, Hamill remained one of the Silvertips' go-to scorers and provided two overtime game-winning goals. Through a tremendous showing in the first half, Beach also contributed some excellent hockey at both ends of the ice, carrying a month-long 12-game point streak from October 6 to November 6. Defenseman and Captain Jonathan Harty was an unsung hero for the Everett offense, posting career highs of eleven goals, 34 assists and 45 points. He was a factor for the 'Tips in the playoffs, leading the team with five points and scoring a game-tying goal with 55 seconds left in regulation to send Game 4 to overtime.

PLAYOFF PERFORMANCES

Even though the Silvertips were dispatched by a talented Spokane Chiefs squad in the first round, there were still a variety of postseason performances that left room for optimism. As noted above, Jonathan Harty practically willed the Silvertips towards victory against Spokane with some especially courageous performances. The hard-hitting 'Tips captain led all playoff scorers with five points. Still, the most outstanding contribution from any of the 'Tips came from the pads of Shayne Barrie, who capped off a strong rookie season with two outstanding playoff performances. Barrie looked spectacular despite dropping Game 4 in overtime, stopping 32 of 35 shots in the losing effort and 56 of 60 overall in the postseason.

YOUNG DEFENSEMEN SEIZE KEY ROLES

As injuries on the back end forced the Silvertips to make adjustments to their roster and defensive pairings, three Silvertip rookies seized the opportunity to showcase their abilities while leading the team into the playoffs. Chris de la Lande, Jeff Regier and Tyler Kieffer picked the second half of the season to contribute their best hockey, as injuries to Taylor Ellington, Graham Poter and Mike Alexander provided an opportunity that the three rookies seized with gusto. Despite the inexperience on the blueline, the 'Tips embarked on an eleven game unbeaten streak (10-0-1) from February 8th through March 7th.

THANK YOU DAN, DANE, AND CLAYTON

The Silvertips received excellent production from their overage players in 2007-08, as Dan Gendur led the team in scoring, Dane Crowley led all defensemen in minutes played, and Clayton Bauer complemented the top line by cashing in goals off rebounds and tip-ins. With the recognition of having the hardest shot in the Western Conference, Gendur was lethal from the point on the power play. Whether he was firing slap shots or reliably accurate wingers, Gendur keyed Everett's power play success and revitalized the top line with Bauer and Hamill. His six points and +5 rating in a 6-0 blanking of the Prince George Cougars on January 23rd was part of an effort in which the Victoria, BC native was named Husky WHL Player of the Month. Gendur scored ten goals and added sixteen assists for 26 points to complement his +9 rating in January, statistically completing the most productive month in Silvertips history as the team went 9-5. Dane Crowley was the workhorse of the Silvertips' defensive corps, often times logging upwards of thirty minutes of ice time in the second half of the season while various players succumbed to injury. Despite the injuries that wreaked havoc on Everett's line pairings, the Silvertips were still able to complete a 19-6-0-1 stretch in the second half partly due to Crowley's added defensive responsibilities and leadership. The Winnipeg, MB native finished with a career-high ten goals and 19 assists for 29 points in 66 games. Acquired in a November trade, Clayton Bauer made an immediate impact on the Silvertips' offense, scoring 19 goals in his first 30 games with Everett. His wrist shot was among the most accurate in the Western Conference, and he put it to use in completing a natural hat trick in an eight-minute and 30-second span in a 4-2 victory over Spokane on January 19th. In 51 games with Everett, the Kelowna, BC native scored 21 goals and added fifteen assists for 36 points.

2008-09 SEASON

The Silvertips 2008-09 season ended when they were eliminated by the Tri-City Americans in five games in the Western Conference Quarterfinals. While posting the team's first losing season with a record of 27-36-7-2, the Silvertips were also able to unearth a younger generation of intriguing future stars while benefiting from the determined leadership of their three 20-year old veterans.

A SHUTOUT TO REMEMBER

Silvertips fans took notice of an impressive relief performance at Seattle by 15-year-old goaltender

Kent Simpson on the final day of the 2007-08 regular season, and it appeared even then that the young goaltender would have a chance to earn playing time as a 16-year-old in 2008-09. In his first career start on September 26, 2008, Simpson stopped all 28 Portland shots and was supported by goals from Mike Alexander and Shane Harper on his way to a 2-0 shutout of the Winterhawks. He earned more playing time in a first half that was highlighted by wins over Tri-City, Spokane and a gritty 3-2 victory at Swift Current in which the rookie delivered a strong presence in net in a difficult road environment to conclude a successful two-week trip.

THE KID LINE

What started as an experiment ended as one of the most accomplished rookie scoring lines in WHL history. Three 17-year-olds – Byron Froese, Kellan Tochkin and Tyler Maxwell – emerged as the Silvertips' most dangerous and consistent offensive threat and perhaps the brightest crop of rookie forwards playing together in the WHL. It started with an eight-goal outburst in a come-from-behind victory over the eventual WHL champion Kelowna Rockets and culminated in their inclusion in NHL Central Scouting's mid-season and post-season draft rankings. Tochkin, a shifty and creative right wing from Abbotsford, BC, became the highest scoring rookie in Silvertips history with 74 points in 72 games en route to receiving the club's Rookie of the Year award and sharing the Iron Man award. Froese, a hard working two-way center out of Winkler, MB, recorded the 26th hat trick in Silvertips history with three tallies against Red Deer on New Year's Eve and also played in all 72 games to share the Iron Man Award. Maxwell, a quick skater and dynamic goal scorer from Manhattan Beach, CA, recorded 22 goals in 57 games and also lifted the team to a 3-2 victory in Game 2 at Tri-City with the first playoff hat trick in club history. The three players combined to post 11 points in a 5-2 win at Moose Jaw in November and a 6-3 win vs Red Deer in December while providing several other offensive outbursts along the way.

HARPER'S HEROICS

After a 43-point breakthrough season in 2007-08, 19-year-old Shane Harper continued his ascendance through the Silvertips scoring ranks with 66 points on 32 goals and 34 assists in 72 games for Everett in 2008-09. With a goal at Seattle on March 1, the right wing out of Valencia, California became the fourth player in team history to record 30 goals in one season, joining John Lammers (38 – 2005-06), Moises Gutierrez (35 – 2006-07) and Zach Hamill (32 – 2006-07) in that group. Having tallied 58 goals through four seasons with the Silvertips, Harper joined Hamill (87) and Kyle Beach (67) as the only players to record 50 goals in a Silvertips uniform. Harper had missed only one game in the last two seasons and suited up in 143 of the team's last 144 regular season games by the end of 2008-09.

TRIAL BY FIRE

The youngest team in Silvertips history had plenty of growing up to do during a 12-day trip through central Canada against the WHL's talented East Division. Buoyed by a collective effort in a 4-1 win at Regina in which Daniel Bartek posted a hat trick – two goals of which were scored shorthanded – and 23 saves by Shane Barrie, the tone of the trip was set midway through the second period when three separate Silvertips went down to block rapid fire Colten Teubert slap shots in one of the year's best defensive efforts. Byron Froese, Tyler Maxwell and Kellan Tochkin combined for 11 points in a 5-2 win at Moose Jaw before the Silvertips concluded the long swing led by several jarring Taylor Ellington hits in a physical 3-2 win at Swift Current. With a 3-1-2-0 record and a robust penalty kill, the road trip proved to be a unifying experience for a team that started the season with 13 rookies.

ROAD WARRIORS

Though the 2008-09 Silvertips did not find as much success on the road as they did at home, several key road victories helped define the team's efforts away from Everett. With wins in Vancouver in both October and March, the Silvertips finished 2-1 at Pacific Coliseum to post a winning record in the home of their B.C. Division rivals for the third time in four years. On October 15, two late third-period goals by Kellan Tochkin tied the game at three before Matthew Lus won it in the ninth round of the shootout. On March 13, the 'Tips jumped out to a 2-0 lead before the Giants stormed back with three unanswered goals to take a 3-2 lead early in the third period. After Tochkin tied it a few minutes later, Byron Froese netted the game-winner as Everett knocked off Vancouver 5-3 in front of 12,141 fans. Following the game, British Columbia native Taylor Ellington signed a three-year contract with the Vancouver Canucks to complete a storybook evening. That win came less than two weeks after a clutch Silvertips performance earned Everett's first two points at the Thunderbirds' new arena in Kent as Shane Harper tied the game late in regulation before providing the only goal of the shootout. It was the Silvertips' first win on the road against the Thunderbirds since January 27, 2007.

ABNEY, FROESE SELECTED IN NHL DRAFT

The Silvertips produced eight NHL draft picks between 2006 and 2008, and the 2009 NHL Draft would prove to continue that recent trend. In the third round the Edmonton Oilers selected forward Cameron Abney with the 82nd overall pick, and then forward Byron Froese was selected by the Chicago Blackhawks in the fourth round (119th Overall)

THANK YOU TAYLOR, GRAHAM AND DANIEL

The youth on the 2008-09 Silvertips was well balanced by the leadership of tested veterans who unified the locker room and defended their teammates on the ice. 20-year-old defensive stalwarts and alternate captains Taylor Ellington and Graham Potuer were among the most relied-upon defensemen in the Western Hockey League, often logging upwards of 25 minutes of ice time per game. Whereas Ellington helped set the team's physical pace as one of the league's premier hitters, Potuer was also able to find his own physical niche en route to blocking over 2,200 shots in his Everett career. Both Potuer and Ellington finished their WHL careers as five-year veterans of the Everett Silvertips, and Ellington's 287 career games played were the most in club history when he moved on from the program. Daniel Bartek, who was acquired from the Brandon Wheat Kings prior to the season, endured several injuries due to the "jam" in his game and the complete effort he devoted night in and night out. Another stellar shot blocker, Bartek's two-way game was evident through his excellence on special teams as he led the Silvertips in shorthanded goals and finished among the leaders in power play goals.

YOU'RE IN SILVERTIP COUNTRY

2009-10 SEASON



With 97 points in 2009-10, the Silvertips enjoyed the second-most successful regular season in team history and thrilled the city of Everett with a 14-game winning streak throughout the month of January. Though finishing tied for the most points in the Western Conference, the Silvertips lost the tie-breaker for the #1 seed to the Tri-City Americans and drew a first-round playoff match up with the defending WHL champion Kelowna Rockets – who eliminated the 'Tips in a tense seven-game series. Everett was led offensively by Shane Harper, who became a case study in WHL

development with continued improvement over his five seasons with the club. Providing over a point per game, he was the offensive anchor of a team that was potent in five-on-five play, scoring the majority of its goals while at even strength. Radko Gudas wrote his own chapter in Silvertips lore, immediately warming to the Silvertips faithful with his leadership skills, competitive energy, and some of the biggest hits Comcast Arena has ever seen. Ryan Murray enjoyed a breakout rookie season with the Silvertips and proved that his future would be something special to watch unfold, while the steady, focused goaltending duo of Thomas Heemskerck and Kent Simpson proved to be the league's most effective with a WHL-low 175 goals allowed. For many reasons, 2009-10 was a season to remember in Everett.

JANUARY 2010: 14 STRAIGHT WINS

Entering January, the Silvertips had their backs against the wall – locked in the toughest part of the schedule with key players and even a coach away due to international competition, a banged up team showed their famous heart and comeback ability in a 6-5 shootout victory over Tri-City. The following night, a clutch late goal secured a 2-1 road victory at Portland, and from there, the Silvertips were rolling. Road wins over Kamloops and Kelowna, a comeback win over Spokane and several strong performances against Chilliwack brought the win streak to eight as the Silvertips headed into overtime against Seattle on January 17. Zack Dailey shoveled a face-off win ahead toward a streaking Shane Harper, who deked around a T-Bird defender and lifted a snapshot over Calvin Pickard's shoulder. The celebration – capped by Dailey running Harper into the corner boards at full speed – set off a raucous celebration inside Comcast Arena that was only eclipsed when the win streak was stretched to 14 games in a 2-1 victory over Kamloops on January 30.

RADKO GUUUUUUUUUUUUDAS

Radko Gudas took very little time to make his presence in a Silvertip jersey known. In the season's second game, Everett trailed 2-1 at Vancouver in the third period before Gudas' game-tying and game-winning goals on accurate wrists from the blueline propelled the 'Tips to an eventual 4-2 win. He covered all areas of the ice in Everett's home opener the following week, leaving bodies in his wake and putting out an early claim as the WHL's top hitter. Reinforced by several thunderous open-ice hits, Gudas' presence on the Silvertips could be measured by more than how many players he left seeing stars. In the locker room he was a quiet yet tenacious leader with hockey in his blood. The son of a Czechoslovakian Olympian and star of 1980's Czech hockey, Gudas inherited leadership traits that were well applied in the locker room and respected by the coaching staff. Representing his country for the second consecutive year at the World Junior Championships, he returned to the Silvertips to enjoy a terrific second half of the season, one that may be remembered best for his iconic hit of a Kamloops forward – shoulder down, hip out, with blue and orange gloves flying – that was among the more popular photos on the Silvertips' website throughout the season. With evidence of his dominating physical attributes, tenacious leadership and clutch performances, this one-of-a-kind Silvertips fan favorite was selected in the third round of the 2010 NHL Draft by the Tampa Bay Lightning. Thank you, Radko Guuuuuuuuuuuudas!

RYAN MURRAY'S WHL DEBUT

Displaying poise, sound decision making skills and an ability to keep the game simple, Silvertips defenseman Ryan Murray's debut season in the Western Hockey League was one to behold. In just 52 games, the 16-year-old racked up 27 points and a +33 rating while laying down the groundwork for a terrific junior career. A gifted passer, Murray found seams in the opponents' defense while manning the point on the power play. His teamwork with Radko Gudas on the back end, including his terrific ability in the corners, helped make the Silvertips the WHL's stingiest defensive team. All these abilities were on the shoulders of a steady, focused, young defenseman who continued to make a name for himself internationally. After his appearance at the World U-17 Hockey Challenge, he served as the youngest player on Team Canada at both the World U-18 Championships and the U-18 Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament, a team he captained to the Gold Medal.

JAY VARADY'S GOLD MEDAL WITH USA HOCKEY

The Silvertips coaching staff made another addition to its trophy cabinet when Jay Varady served as Team USA's Video Coordinator at the 2010 World Junior Championships, winning a Gold Medal with the USA's thrilling 6-5 overtime victory over Canada. The Silvertips learned of the game's outcome during warm-ups prior to a game at Kamloops, providing bragging rights for the Americans on the bus ride to Kelowna following the win. At lunch in the team hotel in Kelowna the next day, Varady rejoined the Silvertips to a standing ovation, walked over to Team Captain Zack Dailey, and put the medal around his neck. Along with Craig Hartsburg, who owns two Gold Medals as Canada's Head Coach at the World Juniors, the Everett coaching staff continued to make a name for itself internationally. Varady was summoned again as an Assistant Coach for Team USA at the Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament, where he won a Silver Medal following a tense 1-0 loss to Canada in the Championship game. Assistant Coach Chris Hartsburg also represented USA Hockey in 2010 as a coach at the Select 15 Festival in Rochester, NY.

NET GAINS

Not all Western Hockey League teams had a reliable goaltender in 2009-10. The Silvertips had two. Thomas Heemskerck and Kent Simpson proved to be the WHL's strongest goaltending duo, combining for a 2.30 goals against average, .926 saves percentage and five shutouts while splitting time nearly evenly. Heemskerck led the league in saves percentage (.927), while Simpson finished second in GAA and SV%. Key saves were mainstays on highlight reels throughout the season – Heemskerck's saves against Jace Coyle on the doorstep in Medicine Hat and against Ryan Howse in a game at Chilliwack were moments that maintained their legacy long after the season ended. With Heemskerck signing an NHL contract with the San Jose Sharks, Simpson was set to take over as the heir apparent to the Everett crease in 2010-11 and continue the Silvertips tradition of reliability in net.

SIMPSON, GUDAS, THERIAU SELECTED IN NHL DRAFT

June 26, 2010 proved to be a memorable day in Silvertip history as the team produced three selections at the NHL Draft. Goaltender Kent Simpson (2nd round / 58th overall) was taken by the Chicago Blackhawks, defenseman Radko Gudas (3rd round / 66th overall) was taken by the Tampa Bay Lightning, and defenseman Alex Theriau (4th round / 109th overall) was selected by the Dallas Stars. Each promptly attended a summer development camp with their new parent club, which for Gudas concluded with an NHL contract.

THANK YOU ZACK, SHANE AND CHRIS

Composure, leadership and camaraderie were enhanced by the three overagers on the Silvertips roster in 2009-10: Chris Langkow, Shane Harper and Zack Dailey. Joining the Silvertips at the start of the season, Langkow seemed to be a perfect fit in a leadership role alongside Harper and Dailey: intelligent, accountable and a hard-worker, he joined the Silvertips seamlessly and immediately became a respected figure in the locker room. Harper – the elite scorer of the three – became the Silvertips' all-time leader in games played and goals scored, while Dailey enhanced his legacy in a Silvertip uniform with his leadership and strong defensive play. When the three combined to form "the 20-year-olds line" in early January, they set off a 14-game winning streak in which they combined for 45 points. From all corners of Silvertip Country, we wish a hearty thank you to Zack, Shane and Chris.

2010-11 SEASON

The 2010-11 Silvertips battled to a 28-33-7-4 record and 67 points, making the playoffs for an eighth consecutive season. The team fell short in its attempt to upset the top-seeded Portland Winterhawks in the first round of the playoffs, losing the series in four games. The Silvertips' tradition of building around a strong defense remained intact, as the team tied for the sixth fewest goals allowed in the WHL. Goaltender Kent Simpson shook off some early inconsistency and was playing his best hockey in the second half of the season when he suffered a season-ending ankle injury in early March. WHL rookie Luke Siemens was handed the goaltending reigns down the stretch, performing admirably in the final eight regular season games to help the

'Tips earn a playoff berth. Offensively, forward Tyler Maxwell amassed the best numbers of his career in 2010-11, scoring 41 goals as part of a 66 point campaign. His 96 career goals ranked second all-time in club history at season's end, just four behind Shane Harper's career mark of 100 goals. With the emergence of young defensemen Evan Morden and Nick Walters and the stellar all-around play of Ryan Murray, the Silvertips had a core group of talented young players to build a competitive team around.

TWO WORDS: RYAN MURRAY

Everett's sophomore defenseman turned in an electrifying season that saw him finish with 46 points (6-40-46), including a torrid second half in which he recorded 30 points (4-26-30) in his final 35 games. Starting the season fresh off a Gold Medal as Canada's captain at the Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament, Murray represented the Silvertips at the CHL Subway Super Series and was a late cut from Canada's World Junior Team as the youngest player in camp. Filling in as interim Team Captain while Landon Ferraro was injured in the second half of the season, Murray's leadership skills and focus were recognized by Everett's hockey staff, who named him the Silvertips' Captain for the 2011-12 season. Despite the busy schedule, Murray still found time to welcome the entire Silvertips team to his hometown of White City, Saskatchewan for a home-cooked meal during Everett's East Division road trip in December. Entering his draft year, Murray had been identified as a potential early selection at the 2012 NHL Entry Draft.

RASMUS RISSANEN SUMMONED BY FINLAND, SIGNS WITH CAROLINA

The Silvertips were represented at the World Junior Championships for the second consecutive year when Rasmus Rissanen was named to Finland's squad at the most prestigious event for players under the age of 20. The Silvertips veteran was excellent defensively, finishing with 14 penalty minutes and a +1 rating in six games played. He was on the ice during Finland's comeback against a talented United States squad despite an eventual overtime loss and was an anchor defensively as Finland allowed just one total goal in wins over Switzerland, Germany and Slovakia. Though Finland suffered several heartbreaking losses and finished in fifth place, Rissanen's experience at the international event led to an outstanding second half of the season in which his rugged style of play and skating ability was constantly on display. Immediately following the season, Rissanen's efforts were recognized by the Carolina Hurricanes, who signed the 2009 sixth-round draft pick to a three-year entry level NHL contract.

WELCOME, SOO GREYHOUNDS!

The Silvertips Preseason Tournament took a different turn in 2010-11, being branded the Holiday Inn Preseason Classic as the OHL's Soo Greyhounds were welcomed to town, pairing the Silvertips against their first opponents outside of the WHL. Trailing 2-0 midway through the third period, Scott MacDonald struck twice and Clayton Cumiskey potted the game-winner as Everett opened the pre-season with a 3-2 win in the loudest pre-season game ever played at Comcast Arena. The Greyhounds split their final two games, eventually beating the Tri-City Americans in their tournament finale. Following the game, the Greyhounds received a standing ovation from the fans in attendance and raised their sticks at center ice as honored (and well-traveled) visitors to Everett's annual tournament.

SILVERTIPS IN THE COMMUNITY: THANK YOU!

To all the fans who participated in the Silvertips' community and charitable events throughout the past year, everyone within the Silvertips organization would like to wish a very strong "Thank You!" Whether the Silvertips were Pinking the Rink, waiting tables to raise money for Boys & Girls Clubs, or visiting elementary schools to promote healthy lifestyle habits, there were so many ways to connect with the team away from Comcast Arena. Pink the Rink was an enormous success on October 29th as fans raised nearly \$40,000 for the Providence General Foundation to support breast cancer research and treatment in Snohomish County. Characterizing the link between the Silvertips and their diehard supporters, season ticket holder Denny Spencer personally donated \$5,000 of his own money to pay for commemorative pink jerseys in memory of his wife, who had recently lost her battle with breast cancer. The jerseys were auctioned off during the game, with Ryan Murray's jersey generating a \$1,500 donation.

THANK YOU CLAYTON, CHAD AND PARKER!

Three Silvertips rode off into the WHL sunset following the 2010-11 season as 20-year-old forwards Clayton Cumiskey, Chad Suer and Parker Stanfield battled and competed all year long to set a terrific example for their younger teammates. Cumiskey, a Silvertips fan favorite since his arrival during the 2009-10 season, served as an assistant captain and drew recognition for his face-off acuity and tight defensive play. Another Silvertip hailing from the WHL breeding ground of Abbotsford, BC, Cumiskey was a throwback to the earlier days of Silvertips hockey, playing with pride, exuding leadership, and acting as a well-respected veteran in a close-knit locker room. Saskatoon, Saskatchewan native Chad Suer joined the Silvertips prior to the 2010-11 season and – despite meeting his teammates and coaches just a few days before the season opener – made an immediate impact as an able-bodied, stalwart defenseman who saw time in all situations on the ice. He quickly settled into a groove with Everett, compiling seven assists and a +5 rating in his first eleven games. Though he suffered a broken jaw just before the Christmas break, he returned to action in early February, playing through pain and discomfort while setting a terrific example for the rest of his teammates. Parker Stanfield joined the Silvertips after three seasons with the Prince George Cougars. The Anaheim, California native was a strong skater who excelled on the forecheck and provided secondary offense for Everett. His two-goal performance at Saskatoon in December was only eclipsed by his three-point night in Tri-City on January 22nd. Maintaining his strong pace against the Americans, it was Stanfield's penalty shot tally that served as the eventual game-winner in a 3-2 win at the Toyota Center on February 22nd. From all fans across Silvertip Country, a huge "Thank You!" goes out to Clayton, Chad, and Parker.

YOU'RE IN SILVERTIP COUNTRY

2011-12 SEASON



Facing a great deal of adversity throughout their ninth season, the Silvertips clawed their way to a fourth-place finish in the U.S. Division with a record of 22-40-2-8 for 54 points. A late-season charge pulled the Silvertips into an 8th place finish in the Western Conference and ninth straight appearance in the WHL playoffs, where Everett bowed out in four games against the top-seeded Tri-City Americans. The story of the season was a steady improvement during the journey from a frustrating first half to a team that played its best hockey of the year during the stretch run. With a youthful roster led by a handful of steady veterans and first-year Head Coach Mark Ferner, the Silvertips became a hard-working team that made life tough on opponents when its physical, gritty

style of play was in full effect. 18-year-old Captain Ryan Murray led the way on the blueline with the help of overagers Brennan Yadlowski and Josh Caron, while Kent Simpson again steadied things in goal and veterans Josh Birkholz and Ryan Harrison set the tone offensively.

SECOND HALF SURGE

After suffering through a trying first half filled with injuries and disappointments, the 2011-12 Silvertips rallied around one another and kept improving before ultimately reaching their goal of extending the franchise's streak of consecutive playoff appearances to nine. Everett had only six wins at the halfway point and sat in last place in the WHL standings into late January, but played over .500 hockey from that point on. The club won 12 games during the last two months of the regular season and finished 9-4-0-1 in its last 14 regular season home games to pass the Seattle Thunderbirds and Prince George Cougars and earn a Western Conference playoff berth. In their thrilling regular season finale on St. Patrick's Day, the 'Tips rallied from four deficits to beat Seattle 6-4 and edge out the rival T-Birds for the final playoff spot in the West.

MURRAY'S WHIRLWIND SEASON

It's hard to imagine a player having more going on around him than Silvertips captain and star defenseman Ryan Murray did in 2011-12. From an injury and all-star events to stellar play down the stretch and ever-growing hype about his NHL Draft status, the spotlight shone brightly on Murray from start to finish. He attended Hockey Canada's preseason world junior camp, missed 20 games (and the Subway Super Series) after an ankle injury, returned just in time to join Team Canada at the World Junior Championships, played in the CHL/NHL Top Prospects Game and fielded dozens of interviews about being a sought-after prospect in the NHL Entry Draft. Amidst all those potential distractions, the unflappable 18-year-old turned in another outstanding effort during his third WHL season. His contributions helped lead the Silvertips into the playoffs, where he then led the team in postseason scoring. Everett posted a .422 winning percentage with Murray in the lineup, compared with .296 when #27 wasn't on the ice, making him the obvious choice for his second straight Silvertips MVP award after sharing that honor with Kent Simpson in 2010-11.

SIMPSON'S SWAN SONG

Fourth-year goaltender Kent Simpson returned to Everett as the Silvertips' most tenured player in 2011-12, having been with the club since his 16-year-old campaign in 2008-09. Before the Chicago Blackhawks prospect went on to spend his overage season in the professional ranks, he ended his final junior season ended on a high note with the 'Tips. Simpson was key to Everett's late-season success, winning 12 of his last 20 starts to hit the 20-win mark for the third straight year. In his last ten regular season starts, Simpson finished with an impressive 2.09 GAA, .938 SV% and two shutouts during the stretch run. The Edmonton, Alberta native broke Leland Irving's record for most saves in a single season (1,935), became the second Everett netminder to surpass 10,000 career minutes and solidified his hold on second place in career wins as a Silvertip (71).

YOUTH MUST BE SERVED

The Silvertips had 13 rookies play significant minutes in 2011-12 and finished the season with nine of those rookies seeing action in the playoffs. At least three 16-year-olds and seven 17-year-olds stuck with the club throughout the year to make Everett one of the youngest teams in the WHL. Forwards Zach McPhee, Kohl Bauml, Jordyn Boyd, Trent Lofthouse, Carson Samoridny, and Ryan Chynoweth, were joined by defensemen Dominik Bittner and Austin Adam and goaltender Austin Lotz to comprise the group of rookies that stuck with Everett for nearly the entire year. In addition to the first-year players, seven more of this year's Silvertips were in their second WHL seasons, leaving the 'Tips only eight players with more than one year of WHL experience. Kohl Bauml was the biggest standout among the first-year group, winning Silvertips Rookie of the Year honors after scoring 14 goals and assisting on 25 others to tie for fifth on the club with 39 points.

BREAKOUT SEASONS

A number of returning Silvertips took their game to new levels in 2011-12, with new roles and career highs popping up throughout the group. Veteran forward Ryan Harrison (a fourth-year WHLer) led the team in assists and finished second on the club in scoring on his way to winning the FIERCE Predator award from the Silvertips Booster Club. Fellow forwards Cody Fowle, Reid Petyk, Josh Winquist, and Jari Ericsson all shattered their previous career-high point totals, and both JT Barnett and Manraj Hayer worked their way back from injuries to play important roles late in the season. 17-year-old Defenseman Nick Walters occupied a top-four spot on the 'Tips blueline and saw his production climb from 4 points and 52 penalty minutes as a rookie to 18 points and 95 penalty minutes during his draft-eligible year. Fellow rearguards Evan Morden and Lucas Grayson also reached new statistical highs and played expanded roles in their second WHL seasons.

A MEMORABLE DRAFT DAY IN PITTSBURGH

More franchise history was written on June 22, 2012 as Ryan Murray's name was the second one called during the 2012 NHL Entry Draft, making him the highest draft pick ever produced by the Everett Silvertips. After Russian sniper Nail Yakupov was taken first by the Edmonton Oilers, the Columbus Blue Jackets made Murray the second overall selection in 2012 – thus confirming the pre-draft rankings and expectations that he wouldn't stay on the draft board for long. Murray surpassed Peter Mueller (8th overall to Phoenix, 2006) and Zach Hamill (8th overall to Boston, 2007) as the highest draft pick to emerge from the Everett program. He wasn't the only Silvertip selected in Pittsburgh, however, as fellow defenseman Nick Walters was taken in the fourth round (116th overall) by the St. Louis Blues, becoming the 15th Silvertips player drafted since 2006.

THANK YOU JOSH B., BRENNAN AND JOSH C.!

The Silvertips' three 1991-born players and alternate captains all concluded their Western Hockey League careers in green & silver during the 2011-12 season. Right wing Josh Birkholz (Maple Grove, MN) was dynamic in his second WHL season, leading the Silvertips in scoring from start to finish. Birkholz used his breakaway speed and lethal wrist shot to electrify the Comcast Arena crowd throughout the year, compiling 29 goals and 28 assists to finish with 57 points. The Florida Panthers draft pick scored a hat trick against Seattle on January 4 and a season-high four points in a 5-4 overtime win over the T-Birds on January 21.

Defenseman Brennan Yadlowski (Edmonton, AB) was a fifth-year WHLer who played three seasons in Lethbridge before coming to Everett in an October 2010 trade. He provided a much-needed veteran presence on the blueline while highlighting his all-around game with 24 points (4g/20a) and 91 penalty minutes. Yadlowski played his 300th WHL game in December and reached 100 career points in March.

Fellow blueliner Josh Caron (Campbell River, BC) joined the 'Tips in late November to finish his career after spending three-plus years with Kamloops. By February, Caron's leadership role was solidified with an "A" on his jersey while his impact as a shut-down defender and one of the most physically imposing players in the league helped solidify Everett's D-corps in the second half of the season. The Silvertips would like to say a huge "Thank You" to all three players for their contributions to the franchise over the past two years!

YOU'RE IN SILVERTIP COUNTRY

2012-13 SEASON



The Everett Silvertips celebrated the club's 10th Anniversary in the Western Hockey League in 2012-13, skating to a regular season record of 25-40-3-4 on the way to their 10th consecutive WHL playoff appearance. With one of the youngest rosters in the league featuring 12 rookies (including five 16-year-olds) by season's end, the Silvertips contended for the #7 seed in the Western Conference before finishing 8th and pushing the eventual WHL-Champion Portland Winterhawks to six games in the first round of the playoffs. Despite their inexperience, a season-ending injury to captain Ryan Murray and a midseason coaching change, the Silvertips continued their streak of consecutive playoff

appearances thanks to the performances of key veteran players and the emerging young talents who would be charged with leading the franchise back into contention in the years to come.

10th ANNIVERSARY SEASON COMBINES PAST AND FUTURE

The Silvertips marked a decade of WHL hockey at Everett's Comcast Arena in 2012-13 since the inception of the franchise in 2003. The 10th Anniversary celebration began with our first Alumni Weekend festivities in early August, when the community welcomed 26 former Silvertips players back to Everett for a dinner & golf outing. The franchise unveiled new logos and a completely re-designed jersey for the 10th Anniversary season, while fans and players had the opportunity to re-live memories from the early days of the Silvertips. Everett then opened the season with a visit from Prince George on September 22, providing a nod to the inaugural home opener in team history – which was also played against the Cougars back on October 4, 2003.

SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

Everett's commitment to building a young core took center stage in 2012-13 as players were given the opportunity to develop on the fly. Team captain and second-overall draft pick Ryan Murray led the charge early after labor strife in the NHL brought about his unexpected return to Everett, but an unfortunate shoulder injury in November ended his 19-year-old season on a similarly surprising note. The Silvertips enjoyed their first four-game winning streak since early 2011 in October, finishing 4-2 on their East Division road swing through Saskatchewan and Manitoba. After winning only six times before Christmas the prior season, the 'Tips notched 13 victories before the break and stood within five games of .500 into late January – shortly after sweeping a three-in-three weekend for the first time in two years. Everett faltered in February but recovered with a few big wins late in the year, none better than a 4-2 triumph over Portland at Comcast Arena on March 2.

LONGTIME SILVERTIP, VETERAN NEWCOMER LEAD THE CHARGE

Fourth-year Silvertips forward Josh Winquist and newly-acquired overage defenseman Landon Oslanski paced Everett's attack in 2012-13 on their way to sharing team MVP honors. The most tenured player with the franchise, Winquist took his offensive game to a new level as a 19-year-old. Despite missing 21 games due to injury, he led the team with a career-high 24 goals, 51 points (giving him exactly a point-per-game average in 51 games) and a +7 rating. Oslanski also turned in a career year with 48 points after being claimed off waivers from Lethbridge just before training camp. He used a booming point shot to smash his previous career high with 17 goals (a single-season franchise record for defensemen) and led the team with 31 assists and 23 power play points (9g/14a) while spending part of the year at forward as the team fought through injuries. Veterans Reid Petryk (40pts), Manraj Hayler (40pts) and Kohl Bauml (21g/36pts) rounded out Everett's top five scorers.

TOP ROOKIES MAKE AN IMPACT

Armed with some of the top young talent in the WHL, the Silvertips got strong performances from a number of rookie contributors. Selected in the first-round of the 2012 CHL Import Draft, Swiss defenseman Mirco Mueller quickly made his mark as one of the league's top young players and became Everett's Rookie of the Year. He ranked second among WHL rookie defensemen with 31 points (6g/25a) and played for Switzerland as an under-ager in the World Junior Championships. Forward Tyler Sandhu turned in one of the best 16-year-old campaigns in team history, ranking second among all 1996-born players in the league with 19 goals and fourth with 33 points before winning the Silvertips' Coaches Award. Rookie forwards Ty Mappin, Carson Stadyk and Dawson Leedahl and defensemen Ben Betker (Everett's Most Improved Player) and Cole MacDonald also spent the entire season with the Silvertips, gaining experience in a variety of situations in their initial foray into the WHL.

LOTZ OF PROGRESS FOR FIRST-YEAR STARTER

After backing-up Kent Simpson as a 16-year-old, second-year goaltender Austin Lotz took some great strides during his first season as Everett's go-to guy between the pipes. The St. Adolphe, Manitoba native endured his share of struggles early on, winning just one of his first ten starts and missing eight games in October due to injury. Lotz began a turnaround in November however, when his first career shutout (a 3-0 win at Tri-City) started a stretch that saw him go 14-12-3-1 through the rest of the regular season. On January 23 in Kamloops, he shattered the previous franchise record with 65 saves on 69 shots to help Everett gain a point in a 4-3 overtime loss. He would go on to finish the season with 15 victories and a .907 saves percentage while stopping at least 40 shots on nine different occasions.

ENDING ON A PLAYOFF POSITIVE

The Silvertips entered the 2013 WHL playoffs on a ten-game postseason losing streak and opened their series against the #1 Portland Winterhawks without a win in the city of Portland in their last 18 tries. Undaunted by predictions of another Winterhawks' sweep, Everett stunned the 'Hawks to win Game 1 and then forced the series back to Comcast Arena with another triumph in Game 5 before finally succumbing to the eventual WHL Champions in six games. The series gave the 'Tips multiple playoff road wins for the first time since 2006 and their first victory when facing elimination since 2005, hopefully showing an early sign of successful playoff runs in the years to come!

THANK YOU RYAN, LANDON AND CONNOR!

For three WHL overage veterans in the Silvertips locker room, 2012-13 marked the end of their careers in junior hockey. Forward & alternate captain Ryan Harrison (from Kelowna, BC) played five seasons in the WHL, spending time with both the Prince Albert Raiders and Medicine Hat Tigers before coming to Everett at the 2011 trade deadline. In his third season with the Silvertips, Harrison reached career milestones of 200 points and 500 penalty minutes along with his landmark 300th WHL game – which was played in his hometown of Kelowna on December 30. Known for bringing a combination of scoring touch and physical play, Harrison totaled 103 points (38g/65a) in 150 games in green and silver. Defenseman & alternate captain Landon Oslanski (Camrose, Alberta) finished his junior career in Everett after three seasons with the Lethbridge Hurricanes. His lone year as a Silvertip was a memorable one, as he topped previous career highs in goals (17), assists (31), points (48) and penalty minutes (96) while winning the Iron Man Award as the only Silvertip to skate in all 72 games. He was also voted the winner of the FIERCE Predator Award from the Silvertips Booster Club. Defenseman Connor Cox (Lethbridge, Alberta) joined the Silvertips in the WHL overage waiver draft after splitting the previous four seasons between the Moose Jaw Warriors and Saskatoon Blades. Providing a much-needed veteran presence on an inexperienced defensive corps, Cox played valuable minutes in all situations while helping smooth the learning curve for his young teammates. He reached 100 points in his WHL career on February 15, finishing the year with 22 points in 66 appearances for a career total of 105 points (12g/93a) in 278 regular season WHL games.

2013-14 SEASON

The Silvertips' 11th season in the WHL saw a resurgence that placed Everett back among the contenders in the top half of the Western Conference. Upon the return of original Head Coach Kevin Constantine to the franchise, the Silvertips tied for second place in the US Division and fourth in the Western Conference with a 39-23-7-3 record and 88 points. Led by one of the strongest overage trios the organization has known and supported by a core of exciting

young talent, Everett became one of the WHL's top defensive clubs while also scoring the third-most goals of any Silvertips team. Despite falling in their first playoff series against the rival Seattle Thunderbirds in the postseason, the Silvertips were one of the WHL's biggest success stories in 2013-14 and set the stage for exciting years to come.

EVERETT'S EXCITING RENAISSANCE

After three straight seasons of finishing below .500 in the standings and securing the last playoff spot in the Western Conference, the Silvertips were the surprise story of the first half of 2013-14. The 'Tips earned victories in 20 of their first 28 games, finishing November with the WHL's best record (20-4-4-0) and making multiple appearances in the CHL/BMO Top 10 Rankings. A rash of injuries and player absences from international competition spurned that early momentum and dropped Everett back within the pack midway through the season, but the 'Tips caught fire again to finish the regular season on an 11-0-0-2 tear that included a nine-game winning streak. Tying for second place in the U.S. Division and fourth in the West with 88 points, the Silvertips posted the third-highest total point in franchise history and engineered a 31-point improvement on their 2012-13 campaign.

KC PICKS UP WHERE HE LEFT OFF

The Silvertips announced on June 13, 2013 that the coach who led them to three U.S. Division titles, a WHL regular season title and a Western Conference Championship between 2003 and 2007 would step behind the bench once again. Original Silvertips Head Coach Kevin Constantine had returned after six years away to lead the franchise for a second time, helping the team adopt a new style of play and turn in immediate results. The Silvertips were the WHL's fifth-best defensive club (surrendering nearly a full goal-per-game less than the two prior seasons), and finished just behind Edmonton for second in shots against per game. At the opposite end of the ice, Everett's 218 goals were the third-most in team history and another marked improvement over recent years. Their disciplined structure helped the 'Tips to a 26-6-1-1 record (.794%) when scoring the first goal of a game and a 32-1 mark (.970%) when leading after two periods of play.

WINQUIST'S RECORD-BREAKING SEASON

Fifth-year Silvertips forward Josh Winquist produced likely the best offensive season in franchise history as an overager in 2013-14. Winquist set a new single-season franchise record with 47 goals, topping the previous record of 42 set by Shane Harper in 2009-10 to become the first Silvertip to finish among the WHL's top-five goal scorers. He contributed 46 assists in 67 games to finish the year with 93 points, equaling Zach Hamill's team record achieved in 2006-07. Winquist also broke Hamill's team record with an 18-game point streak from October 20 to December 3 with 40 points (16g/24a) in that span. By season's end, Winquist had climbed into second all-time in Silvertips career goals (101), assists (115) and points (216) and third in games played (301). He was named a Western Conference Second Team All-Star and earned WHL Player of the Month honors for November 2013.

16 & PROVEN

Everett still iced a young roster in 2013-14 and was the only WHL team to carry four 16-year-olds throughout the season. All four 1997-born skaters proved not only worthy of their roster spots, but became reliable impact players. On defense, the intelligent play of smooth-skating 2012 first-round Bantam pick Kevin Davis (1g/8a) and the physicality of gritty Noah Juulsen (2g/8a, +12 rating) belied their ages. Both logged significant minutes while playing regular shifts on Everett's defense corps, including during high-pressure shorthanded situations and occasionally on the power play. Up front, Patrick Bajkov provided a surprise scoring boost with nine goals and 19 points in the regular season (plus three more goals in the playoffs), while Matt Fonteyne (4g/5a) showed his versatility in a variety of different ways and was called upon to fill the role of veteran center Kohl Bauml due to injury late in the year.

ROOKIES IN NAME ONLY

Forwards Ivan Nikolishin and Jujhar Khaira may have been rookies in 2013-14, but both brought experience and made an impact greater than that of most first-year players. Nikolishin was selected in the second round of the 2013 CHL Import Draft and came to Everett from his native Russia for his 17-year-old season. A highly skilled player with natural offensive instincts, Nikolishin finished second on the team and among all WHL rookies in scoring with 59 points on 18 goals and 41 assists while playing in all 72 games. His 33 power play points (9g/24a) led all first-year players, while his 18 goals tied for fifth. Khaira was assigned to the Silvertips for his 19-year-old season after leaving Michigan Tech University to sign an NHL contract with the Edmonton Oilers. A sizable power forward from Surrey, BC who was often nearly impossible to knock off the puck, Khaira scored 16 goals and totaled 43 points to go with a +5 rating and 59 penalty minutes in 59 games.

THANK YOU JOSH, MANRAJ AND MATT!

Two longtime members of the Silvertips and one impactful newcomer saw their junior careers come to a close as Everett's three overagers in 2013-14. Five-year Silvertips forward Josh Winquist (St. Albert, AB) got better and better throughout his entire junior career, consistently achieving new statistical milestones all the way through the record-breaking overage campaign outlined above. Armed with great vision, play making ability and an always-dangerous shot, he joined former teammate Shane Harper as the only two players in team history to skate in 300 career games, record 200 points and score 100 goals for the club.

Center Manraj Hayer (Vancouver, BC) spent four seasons in green & silver, the last two of which he served as an Alternate Captain for the club. The speedy and skilled Hayer was always tough for opponents to handle and made his linemates better when he was on the ice, a point illustrated by Everett's 34-12-5-2 record with him in the lineup in 2013-14. Despite being plagued by injuries for much of his career, he finished with over 100 career points in nearly 200 games and posted career highs with 43 points and a +11 rating in his final season.

Defenseman Matt Pufahl (Saskatoon, SK) may have been new to Everett for his last junior campaign after stints with Red Deer and Saskatoon, but he'll be remembered as a former team captain who enjoyed one of the best offensive seasons ever by a 'Tips blueliner. Acquired from the Blades in an off-season trade, Pufahl was promptly named Silvertips captain in October and immediately became a leader both on and off the ice. He quarterbacked Everett's top power play unit on his way to a career high 50 points, including 15 goals to more than double his previous best. Pufahl reached 100 career points and 200 career games played in 2013-14.

2014-15 SEASON



Silvertips advanced past the first round for the first time in eight years by topping the Spokane Chiefs before falling to the defending Western Conference Champion Portland Winterhawks in the second round.

BANNER HUNG, PLAYOFF ROUND WON

The Silvertips put an end to two significant franchise droughts during their 12th season, both earning their first U.S. Division title and winning a playoff series for the first time since 2007. The 'Tips took over the U.S. Division lead on October 24 and stood alone in first place until Portland pulled even during the final week of the season. Everett managed to hold off the Winterhawks to clinch the fourth division title in team history in the regular season home finale on March 21. As the #2 seed in the Western Conference playoffs, the 'Tips ended a streak of eight consecutive series losses in a hard-fought first round matchup against Spokane. Everett built a 3-1 series lead before the Chiefs forced a Game 6, which proved to be the third overtime game of the series and the longest game in franchise history. Brayden Low scored the series-clinching goal at 3:43 of triple overtime to send the 'Tips to the second round where, the 'Tips suffered three one-goal defeats as Portland prevailed in five games despite a narrow 17-14 goal differential.

A SILVERTIPS SCORING RECORD

After losing four of their top five 2013-14 scorers to graduation, one of Everett's biggest question marks entering 2014-15 was if the team would create enough offense. Led by the production of Nikita Scherbak, Carson Stadnyk, Ivan Nikolishin and Kohl Bauml, that question was answered in the affirmative throughout the year before the Silvertips finished with a franchise-record with 242 goals for the season – topping the previous mark of 239 from 2006-07. The club's well-balanced offensive attack was on display as every veteran skater on the team who played more than 40 games (14 in all) reached a new career-high point total. The 'Tips boasted five 20-goal scorers and five players who topped the 50-point mark, both of which tied franchise bests. Everett's scoring numbers were bolstered by the highest power play percentage in franchise history at 24.3%; good enough for third best in the WHL. The Silvertips enjoyed a stretch of 15 straight games with a power play goal early in the season and then tallied 18 power play goals over a ten-game stretch in January.

SCHERBAK WAS A SURE BET

Two days after a season-opening shutout win over the Seattle Thunderbirds, the Silvertips' lineup gained a great deal of firepower with the acquisition of Montreal Canadiens first-round draft pick Nikita Scherbak in a trade with Saskatoon. The dynamic Russian winger had enjoyed a breakout rookie season with the Blades on his way to being selected 26th overall by Montreal in the 2014 NHL Draft. He made his Silvertips debut in the home opener on October 3, thrilling the home crowd with two goals and three points to set the tone for a stellar year. Scherbak netted his first career hat trick on November 5 vs. Red Deer and registered at least one point in 32 of his first 35 games in Silvertips green. He would go on to record the fourth-highest single season point total in franchise history, racking up 82 points on 27 goals and 55 assists (tied for third-most in team history) in 65 games to lead the team in scoring. His +33 plus/minus rating also tied Ryan Murray from 2009-10 for the third-highest rating in a single season.

JUULSEN TURNS IN A GEM

Defenseman Noah Juulsen was expected to follow up a strong 16-year-old campaign with a big step forward in his second WHL season, but few could have anticipated just how pronounced his progress would be. The Abbotsford, BC native skated with Ben Betker to form Everett's top defensive pair at even strength and on the penalty kill, while his booming point shot made him a centerpiece of the club's dangerous power play unit. After posting a modest ten points in his rookie season, Juulsen exploded offensively for 52 points (9g/43a) in 68 games to rank fifth on the team and ninth among all WHL defensemen in scoring as a 17-year-old. He also finished among the league leaders in power play points and finished second on the club with a +22 rating. Off the ice, his work ethic and approach earned him the Silvertips' Most Dedicated Player Award. Juulsen was selected to play in the CHL/NHL Top Prospects Game in January and was ranked 22nd among all North American skaters for the 2015 NHL Draft by NHL Central Scouting.

A TROUBLESOME 'TENDING TANDEM

Both Silvertips goaltenders proved to be a handful for opposing scorers as Everett allowed the second-fewest goals in the WHL. Veteran Austin Lotz carried the load for much of the season; finishing 5th in the league with a 2.73 GAA, a .850 shootout SV% and four shutouts. Lotz was nearly unbeatable in the shootout at times, stopping 27 of 29 opposing shooters over four straight shootout wins in November and December. His first WHL game in his home province of Manitoba was one of the best performances of his career as Lotz turned in a 35-save shutout of the high-scoring Brandon Wheat Kings on January 6. By March, 16-year-old rookie and former 8th round WHL Bantam Draft pick Carter Hart had earned the starting job with his stellar play after the New Year. Hart went a 13-2-0-3 with three shutouts from January to the end of the regular season, finishing first among all WHL goaltenders with a 2.29 GAA and tying for second with a .915 SV% for the season. The Sherwood Park, AB product continued to excel while starting all 11 'Tips playoff games, tying for second among playoff goalies with a 2.28 GAA and ranking third with a .929 SV%.

THANK YOU KOHL, BEN AND BRAYDEN

Few overage trios in franchise history have included players with Everett careers as long and celebrated as the ones that took the ice in 2014-15. Kohl Bauml, Ben Betker and Brayden Low all played substantial roles in helping the Silvertips rise from the bottom of the standings to the U.S. Division title during their tenures with the club.

Team Captain Kohl Bauml (Saskatoon, SK) set career highs in every statistical category during his fourth and final season with the 'Tips, leading the team with 30 goals and contributing 30 assists for 60 points along with a +21 rating. He was a key faceoff man and penalty killer and fought through injury to play every game until being rested in the season finale. Anchoring the "Saskatoon Platoon" line with fellow Saskatoon natives Carson Stadnyk (69 points) and Dawson Leedahl (33 points), Bauml climbed to fifth in team history in career goals (79) and games played (273) and sixth in total points (163) while being named the 'Tips Most Valuable Player. Defenseman and alternate captain Ben Betker (Cranbrook, BC) took on a huge role as an overager for the 'Tips, capping his three-year career with an impressive campaign resulting in 31 points (6g/25a), a +19 rating and 63 penalty minutes. The 6-foot-6, 220-pounder was voted "Best Stay-at-Home Defenseman" in the annual Best of the West poll and led the way for the Everett defense corps while playing largely against opponents' top lines. A 6th round pick of the Edmonton Oilers in 2013, Betker earned his entry-level NHL contract and signed with the Oilers in March – just days after his 200th WHL game. Left wing and alternate captain Brayden Low (Richmond, BC) continued to be an example of dedication and perseverance in his 20-year-old season, again winning a roster spot and delivering for the Silvertips. Low turned in by far his best statistical year in his swan song, scoring 16 goals and assisting on 16 others for 32 points to go with a +20 rating and a team-leading 99 penalty minutes. Originally acquired from the BCHL as an injury fill-in during the 2012-13 season, he went on to play 187 WHL games while establishing himself as a spirited competitor, leader and teammate during a three-year run with the Silvertips.

2015-16 SEASON

The Everett Silvertips of the 2015-16 season represented a fascinating element of evolution and poise. They underwent change. They underwent transformation. And by the end of the season, they would undergo glances of euphoria. Entering the season, they were forced to adjust with the loss of Nikita Scherbak (AHL), Kohl Bauml (graduation), Ivan Nikolishin (trade) and Brayden Low (graduation), in addition to the reliable Ben Betker (graduation/AHL). It meant the subtraction of their top three scorers and 39 percent of their goal-scoring production. But by the time the puck dropped, it wouldn't matter. The Silvertips were a contending threat once again for the U.S. Division title, holding a share or

sole possession of first place from mid-December to early March. Settling for a second place finish, the unwavering approach of head coach Kevin Constantine and his staff helped the depth of seven different double-digit goal scorers, an air-tight defensive corps (allowing a paltry 2.3 goals per game, second lowest in the entire Canadian Hockey League), and coming-of-age in goaltender Carter Hart contribute to another near 40-win campaign. By the end of the year, the Silvertips delivered a shocking playoff statement, a decorated goaltender ready for the NHL spotlight, and a promising collection of youth who made a significant impact in several key victories.

PUNCHING THROUGH THE PLAYOFFS, IN IT ALL WINTER

Nearly producing a mirror image season of its predecessor, 2014-15, the Silvertips kept hold of first place or division title contention for the entire regular season. Winning its season opener at Prince George, 2-0 behind Carter Hart's shutout, the tone was set for the season behind a relentless defense and timely goal scoring. The Tips seized command of first place after a 7-4 victory at Spokane behind Remi Laurencelle's four-goal onslaught on Dec. 16, maintaining the lead all the way until early March even in the absence of captain Dawson Leedahl for 13 straight games due to injury. Goaltender Carter Hart, building a decorated draft eligible season behind 63 games and a league high 35 wins, missed the final four regular season games which thrust backup Mario Petit into a starting role for the opening round of the WHL Playoffs. It only punctuated the Tips trait of resiliency – Petit furnished an incredible 29 save shutout in his playoff debut, the second goalie in Tips history to accomplish the feat – in a 3-0 win over the Portland Winterhawks which set the tone for a four-game sweep, capped by Hart's return and a 28 save win in Game 4 at Moda Center. The second round required the Silvertips to get through the division frontrunner Seattle Thunderbirds, but started with a bang through a 3-0 Tips blanking in Kent. With several key Tips injured, the Thunderbirds won the next four games – including a pair of one-goal margins in games 4-5 – to claim the series.

THE DEFENSE (NEVER) RESTS

For the second straight season, the Silvertips were forced to find new key offensive torchbearers after their top three scorers departed due to graduation or AHL promotion. Instead of replacing 242 goals, the Silvertips steered in a different direction of success by way of pure defiance. Behind a defense that headlined first round draftee (Montreal) Noah Juulsen, no blueliner finished the season with a minus rating. All first-year, 99-born skaters combined for a +1 rating while club Rookie of the Year Connor Dewar didn't miss a regular season game, potting 11 goals including four game winners. Goaltender Carter Hart, fully taking the reins from overager Austin Lotz, notched six shutouts and a 2.14 goals-against-average. Overager Remi Laurencelle's 28 goals were good for the Tips lead, while a cast of six additional teammates hit the double digit goal plateau. To round out the evolution of the Silvertips, their microscopic 2.3 goals allowed per game finished second in the entire CHL after leading the pace for much of the season and their 26 shots allowed per game was lowest in the entire WHL.

HART AND SOUL

Starting his encore season as a draft eligible goaltender, Carter Hart brought down the house with an MVP campaign delivering contention for a roster spot on Canada's World Juniors squad, and the honor as the first goaltender taken in the 2016 NHL Entry Draft. The composed, gifted, and concentrated netminder launched the season at a record breaking pace with six shutouts in his first 21 appearances, climbing to a third place tie with Lotz on the career chart by the end of the season. In November, Hart represented the Tips and WHL in the Canada-Russia Series circuit, CHL/NHL Top Prospects Game, and on the NHL Draft stage two months after the season's conclusion as a second round selection by the Philadelphia Flyers. Hart became the first greater Seattle area based goaltender in 17 years to earn the Vaughn CHL Goaltender of the Year award, supplemented by the Del Wilson Memorial Trophy as WHL Goaltender of the Year. The 6-foot-1, 170-pound goaltender was named Silvertips MVP in 2015-16, earning a WHL best 35 wins and was second in goals against average (2.14), tied for second in shutouts (6), and second in minutes (3,693), en route to a 35-23-1-3 record and First Team All-Star selection in the Western Conference of the WHL.

THE RIGHT WAY WITH REMI

The transformation of Remi Laurencelle began with a trade from the Lethbridge Hurricanes in 2013-14 and hit the finish line with an overage campaign flourishing with a 28-goal, 30-assist, and 58-point output, career highs in all categories. He led the Tips in scoring and headlined six other Silvertips who supplied double-digit goal scoring totals. The Winnipeg native forward took the reins as the Silvertips top line center, skating as a pivot for Carson Stadnyk and Dawson Leedahl while sparking the Tips power play with 18 points on the man advantage. At his peak, his combination of skill and fearlessness delivered euphoric moments: he opened XFINITY Arena with a game-winning, overtime goal against Spokane on Oct. 10, and hammered the Chiefs again with a career-high four-goal, six-point (one shy of the Tips record) game in a 7-4 victory on Dec. 16. However, very few were more awestruck than the night of Feb. 20 before 7,876 home fans, when he slammed a game-winning goal with 15.3 seconds left in regulation to slay the rival Thunderbirds, 4-3. As his numbers stood out, so did his approach to each game: Laurencelle was selected as winner of the Silvertips F.I.E.R.C.E. Predator Award in March.

DEWAR OF GOOD THINGS

Few could have imagined the above-and-beyond results delivered by Connor Dewar, who never missed a game and punched 11 goals on the season, including four as game-winners. Signed at the conclusion of training camp, the product of The Pas, Manitoba locked up the Silvertips season opening win at Prince George with an empty netter, and electrified the XFINITY Arena faithful with a handful of timely goals and a pitbull-like approach each shift. His impact resonated across special teams, depth, and first line roles which solidified a co-honoree nod as Iron Man of the Year, while seizing the Silvertips Rookie of the Year honors.

THANK YOU REMI, CARSON, AND COLE

In the year of transition circling the Silvertips seniority, the core of Carson Stadnyk, Remi Laurencelle, and Cole MacDonald preserved a winning aftertaste from the division banner 2014-15 season and contributed in leading roles which kept the Silvertips in contention for a second straight title, geared a first round sweep of the Portland Winterhawks, and secured the undying admiration of grateful Silvertip fans far and wide for their contributions. Remi Laurencelle (Winnipeg, MB) assumed further grip on a leadership role and boasted career-highs in all scoring categories, leading the Silvertips with 28 goals and 58 points. Laurencelle elevated his game in a top line role and key power play time, much of the time existing as a menace in high-traffic areas to find open space. That presence was felt in crunch time with six game winning goals, leading the Silvertips, while punching in another in the WHL Playoffs to supplement a team-leading four goals. Laurencelle, in addition to leading the Silvertips in scoring, was recognized as recipient of the club's F.I.E.R.C.E. Predator award. A role model of durability, forward Carson Stadnyk (Saskatoon, SK) paved the way as the senior Silvertip in his final season, eventually ending his five-year career with 286 games played, fifth on the franchise's all-time list. He only missed four games over his last four seasons. His 21 goals completed a run of three consecutive 20-goal seasons, while a +13 rating completed a swing of a +31 rating over the course of the last two seasons, where the Silvertips amassed a combination of 81 wins. Defenseman Cole MacDonald (Wetaskiwin, AB) emerged as a quiet, yet rocksteady presence on the Silvertips blueline to help anchor a corps that allowed the fewest shots per game in the WHL, while tying a career-high in points (36) and coming within a goal shy of matching another (9). His plus-6 rating was a career-best as well, and the 6-foot-1, 201-pounder continuously exploited obstructed shot lanes to put pucks on net, contributing to ten power play points. By the season's end he would wind up as the Silvertips leading point-getter on the blueline, masterfully rounding his development from an undrafted WHL hopeful into one of the all-time Tips mainstays. His 266 career games in green and white finished the season as sixth on the Tips all-time list.

YOU'RE IN SILVERTIP COUNTRY



2016-17 SEASON

When examining the outlook of the Everett Silvertips 14th season in the Western Hockey League, the words promise, potential, pattern, and even peril were very much in play. But to paraphrase a cliché, championships aren't decided "on paper." And for many questions the Silvertips had, they delivered an answer all year long embracing the simple factor of "magic." In spite of more top scoring losses like Remi Laurencelle (graduation), Carson Stadnyk

(graduation) and prior captain Dawson Leedahl (trade) – not to mention a rash of injuries – the Silvertips stubbornly weathered the storm and behind the in-net wizardry of Carter Hart, an electrifying special teams unit and a young corps that grew up rapidly, would end the season poised to raise their fifth U.S. Division banner to the rafters.

To no one's surprise, they would engage in a neck-and-neck race with a seasoned Seattle Thunderbirds squad, returning a host of players from the previous season's Western Conference title. Seizing first place by the middle of October on the strength of their best 10-game start (8-1-1) in 10 years, the Tips were ranked in the CHL's Top 10 for a bulk of the season. Reigning WHL and CHL Goaltender of the Year Carter Hart continued to build his legendary resume with another eight shutouts, 32 wins, and a career best .927 save percentage. He wound up as a silver medalist at the World Juniors, second all-time in Tips history for shutouts, and seven off the WHL all-time mark. That "young" Tips team also allowed only 2.3 goals per game, lowest in the entire WHL en route to their fifth U.S. division title. The celebration in front of nearly 8,000 screaming fans at XFINITY Arena on Fan Appreciation Night wasn't the curtain dropping highlight. The Tips took the hockey world by storm in their first round series win over the Victoria Royals in six games. The elimination game fully embraced attrition and was one for the ages, with the Tips winning in five overtimes, shattering the WHL and CHL record for longest game in history.

HANG ANOTHER BANNER, MAKE SOME HISTORY.

It didn't matter the Silvertips lost their top scorer, nor the competition seemed to refuse to scale back all season. The Silvertips "found a way," opening a reward for their hard work in the final home game of the regular season before a near sellout crowd in downtown Everett – their fifth U.S. Division banner in just 14 seasons in the WHL. Along the way, the Silvertips survived an early season injury scare to several key players and the subtraction of captain Noah Juulsen and Hart, obligated to Team Canada at the World Junior Championships for nearly a month. The Silvertips hit 100 points to seize the top record in the Western Conference, going 25-7-2-2 at home, 19-9-7-1 on the road, and 18-12-6-2 against the fierce U.S. Division. Amazingly, the Silvertips faced a daunting task of four games in five days while trailing the Seattle Thunderbirds entering the stretch for the division crown – three on the road in Kelowna, Victoria, and Tri-City (opponents with a combined home record of 56-35-6-0) – and a home game after skating the night before in Victoria. The Silvertips never lost in regulation and wrapped up the division title with their third straight win in four days, 5-2 over the Royals on Saturday night, Mar. 18. They finished the stretch 3-0-1-0 and soared through their last 10 games at 6-2-1-1. In the playoffs, the first round concluded with a game and win for the ages – 3-2 in an odyssey-like five overtimes over Victoria in Game 6 at Save-On-Foods Memorial Centre – concluding the longest game in CHL history and a marathon contest that lasted nearly six hours. Cal Babych's game winning goal, eventually a part of artifacts sent to the Hockey Hall of Fame, came when he stole a pass at the Silvertips blueline and raced away for a breakaway goal on Griffen Outhouse's glove, 11:36 into the fifth extra period.

THE DEFENSE (STILL NEVER) RESTS

The more things change, indeed, the more they stood the same. Accounting for the loss of Cole McDonald, Ben Betker, and Brycen Martin over the last two seasons, the Silvertips blueline never wavered. They registered 2.3 goals per game, once again lowest in the entire Western Hockey League. Even though Noah Juulsen appeared in just 49 games over the season due to a month's absence with Team Canada, and a late season injury, he arguably put up his best all-around season with 12 goals, 34 points, and a +15 rating. Kevin Davis took the leap to the next level many were waiting for since he was drafted in the first round in 2012. He torched the scoresheet all year with a career-high 59 points and +17 rating, leading all Tips blueliners in scoring. His eight power play goals, coming as a point man on the Tips man advantage, were tied for fourth in the WHL. When Davis or Juulsen scored a goal, the effects were felt, and the Tips went a combined 18-0-2 when they buried a goal. Seasoned all-around defenseman Aaron Irving was brought in at the trade deadline in a blockbuster deal with Edmonton and he put up 15 points in 34 games. Sophomore Jake Christiansen continued to grasp the learning curve with 19 points and a +16 rating, never missing a game.

HUNGRY HART

The resume continued to get fatter for Carter Hart, who added to his legacy by seizing WHL Goaltender of the Year honors for the second straight year. Coming off that and the CHL award from the year prior, questions rose about Hart's potential to maintain his pace after an eye-popping season that led to him being taken as the first goalie off the board in the 2016 NHL Entry Draft. His play answered those questions with an emphatic statement. He was the only goalie with a goals-against-average under 2.00 per game in the league, led the WHL with nine shutouts, and tied the league best mark of a .927 save percentage – all while coming within a shave of the gold medal at the World Juniors. Beginning the year as an honoree by the Seattle Mariners to throw the ceremonial first pitch in a game at Safeco Field, he ended it with an extra innings like marathon. In the Silvertips five-overtime win against the Victoria Royals in game 6 of the opening round, Hart allowed just two goals in 151:36 of play.

BURNING BAJKOV

A linchpin to the Silvertips offense and power play, and loaded with potential as a mainstay for the homegrown "1997-born class," Patrick Bajkov unlocked more potential in 2017-18 by taking advantage of experience and soaring to the top as the Silvertips leading scorer. In his fourth season as a Tips forward, Bajkov bagged career highs in all scoring categories – 29 goals, 49 assists, and 78 points. His five game winning snipes were also a career high. A part of the scoring leaders for much of the WHL season, Bajkov also made Tips history: his natural hat trick against the Medicine Hat Tigers on Dec. 2 was the 47th hat trick in club history and he broke the Tips record for fastest two goals by one player (15 seconds). His deft touch with finding the open teammate and pinpoint precision with his wrist shot made him a dual threat from the right side, a spot where he frequented on the Tips power play. In the playoffs, he was simply unstoppable in the opening round against the Victoria Royals, with 10 points in six games against the team just 90 minutes away from his hometown of Nanaimo, B.C. Rewarding his perseverance, he accepted the Tips Leading Scorer and (co-recipient) Iron Man awards before the raucous crowd at XFINITY Arena on Mar. 18. By the summer season, he was in hot demand, and took the ice as one of the few to first don the Vegas Golden Knights jerseys at development camp.

THANK YOU ZWERGER, SKRUMEDA, IRVING

Although only together for less than a season as the core of the Silvertips veteran group, the experience and poise of Dominic Zwerger, Aaron Irving, and Lucas Skrumeda cohesively worked to help raise the Tips fifth U.S. Division banner by the end of the season. Their skill, knowledge, and savvy went a long way by leading a large crop of 2000, 1999, and 1998-born players who matured rapidly throughout the season to play high-impact roles during crunch time. By the end of the playoffs, their authoring of the next great Silvertips chapter would be immortalized for Silvertip Country.

Lucas Skrumeda (Winnipeg, MB) came full circle formerly as a listed Silvertip d-man who made the squad in 2014-15 and rose to a trusted presence as a top-pair defenseman. He logged career highs in points (16) and plus-minus (+18), despite missing 25 games mostly due to injury. As a dependable left shot defenseman and attached with Noah Juulsen on the same pairing, his skating agility was an extremely important ingredient not often seen on a stat sheet, but crucial to staying in pace with the top offensive gunslingers across the league he would often see coming down his side of the ice. Armed with a deft passing touch and offensive savvy, the familiar scoring threat of Dominic Zwerger was brought in by trade from the Spokane Chiefs in the first week of the regular season, immediately helping strengthen the Silvertips offensive depth. He had career highs in goals (28), assists (47), and points (75), also logging a staggering 20 multi-point games. Aaron Irving, who etched his name in championship lore as a member of the Edmonton Oil Kings Memorial Cup squad of 2013-14, delivered an immediate impact on the Silvertips dressing room with his fierce and determined presence. From the blueline, his cannon point shot helped rack up a career high 58 points in 71 combined games, coming over to the Silvertips near the deadline in a blockbuster trade from Edmonton on Jan. 4. By the time his career came to a close, Irving left as a champion on multiple levels, captaincy experience, and 277 career games between the Tips and Oil Kings along with 141 points and a +11 rating.

2017-18 SEASON

The 15th Anniversary season of the Everett Silvertips was strung with strength, grit, and persistence as they battled their Western Hockey League opponents night after night. In spite of losing the defensive powerhouses of Noah Juulsen (to NHL) and Aaron Irving (pro, overage), the 2017-18 Tips hardly skipped a beat by the end of the season when it came down to adjusting and thriving under the roster they had. The season saw a group of young men rally through injuries, the absence of goaltender Carter Hart (2018 World Junior Ice Hockey Championships), and striking trades behind the leadership of key players and an influential class of 20-year-olds. All of that was to mix in a new voice behind the bench, with Dennis Williams named new Tips head coach early in the summer. His success with previous stops in Amarillo (NAHL) and Bloomington (USHL), combining for a win percentage over .600, provided a blueprint for the Silvertips to escalate to new levels with

development, offensive production, and perhaps, a return to deep postseason glory. After raising their sixth U.S. Division banner, the team of relentless athletes with unbelievable potential pressed on to claim the second Western Conference Championship title in franchise history.

After a rocky start to the regular season – the Tips didn't get Carter Hart and young protégé Dustin Wolf fully healthy until Halloween – they concluded October and entered November with a number of neck-and-neck wins against challenging U.S. Division opponents such as a speedy Portland Winterhawks roster and the ever-violent competitors with their Seattle Thunderbirds rivals. Two-time WHL Top Goaltender and current WHL MVP Hart even further advanced his reign by logging yet another career-high season with a .947 save percentage. He carried the team through 31 regular season wins and, while the young 16-year old Wolf held down the fort in Everett, he won a gold medal for Canada at the World Juniors. After a hard-fought winter, the Tips concluded the regular season with victories over key U.S. Division opponents. After only one goal separated their second-to-last game win over the Victoria Royals, they road tripped into enemy territory for a rematch on Vancouver Island and finished the evening with a massive 8-1 victory to close out the regular season. Under Williams, who broke the Tips franchise record for most wins (47) as a first year head coach, the Silvertips clubbed a franchise record 246 goals and for the first time in franchise history had seven players record 20 goals, or more.

The History in the Rafters

With a group hungry for success and trades that shaped the course of the season, the Silvertips captured the U.S. Division. Six weeks later, the relentless group won the second Western Conference Championship title in franchise history. Rally season began in late October, despite the absence of star goaltender Carter Hart. Backup goalie Dustin Wolf, 16, made his debut in Kamloops with a Tips team coming in with a 4-9-1 record. After a 3-1 win in Sandman Centre, the team went on to win 37 of 48 games. The next two months were highlight-worthy, with an October 29 goal from Patrick Bajkov. In dramatic fashion, Bajkov forehanded the highlight reel-winning goal with less than 30 seconds left in regulation, pulling his team to a 3-2 victory over Portland. Less than three weeks later, the Tips faced Portland again, capturing another victory with a season-high of eight goals as they seized first place for the first time all year. The team came in hot after a short holiday vacation as Riley Sutter (four goals) and his team broke a franchise record with 11 goals against Vancouver (11-0 win). They kept the fire burning for the next two weeks as they scored nine goals against Victoria and shut out Tri-City 4-0 in the first game after a blockbuster trade with Kamloops landed Garrett Pilon (C) and Ondrej Vala (D), designed to strengthen the Tips depth for the postseason. In a late January game vs Spokane, the Silvertips rose from a 5-3 deficit in 3rd period. Connor Dewar tied the game with an extra attacker on the ice and less than minute left in regulation, leading his team to a 6-5 OT win. The following week was a hotspot for the record books as Bajkov broke the Silvertips all-time record for points and Carter Hart tied Tyson Sexsmith for the WHL record in shutouts. The team blasted through the nearing end of their regular season, capturing a mid-February victory at Kent—the first Tips win there in the past two years. With a massive OT win against Seattle on March 3 in front of a near-sellout home crowd, a fire was lit under Everett's roster to capture the U.S. Division against Victoria. Following a 3-2 home win vs the Royals on Fan Appreciation Night, the Silvertips returned to Victoria and claimed the U.S. Division title hitting eight goals (or more) for 5th time that year and set a new franchise record for goals in a season. The team entered the playoffs and faced the rivaled Seattle Thunderbirds in the first round, eliminating them (4-1 series win) for the first time in franchise history. They proceeded to eliminate the Portland Winterhawks in only five games and advanced to the Western Conference finals for the first time since 2006. With a 3-2 series lead against the Tri-City Americans, the Silvertips were down 5-3 in game six and staring at a potential season cliffhanger Game 7 in the face. Dewar scored with ten minutes left in regulation, triggering a rally that eventually led to a miraculous 6-5 OT win dubbed the "Kennewick Comeback." Kevin Davis buried the OT winning goal on a power play point shot. The team returned to Everett with the second Western Conference Championship in franchise history, hanging another banner to mark the concrete victories of the 2017-18 season which included their first two wins in the WHL Championship Series against Swift Current (ending in six games).

The Influential Trades

While saying goodbye to beloved players is never easy, the 2018 trade season presented the Silvertips with the biggest trade in franchise history. The team acquired Ondrej Vala (D) and Garrett Pilon (C) from the Kamloops Blazers in exchange for Orrin Centazzo (LW), Montana Onyebuchi (D), a first round and a fourth round selection in the 2019 WHL Draft, and the rights to prospect forwards Nate Hinds and Kalen Ukrainetz. This exchange addressed needs in scoring depth and on Everett's blueline, acquiring players who had the experience and preparation to fill gaps. Vala, 19, was seasoned in his third year in the WHL as a Dallas Stars prospect, with 66 points in 163 career games with Kamloops. The 6'4, 210-pound defenseman continued to put up 8 points for Everett and concluded the regular season with a +14 rating. Pilon, 19, led Kamloops as a Washington Capitals prospect in scoring as an alternate captain through 39 games this past season with 44 points and also led the Blazers in goals, assists, power play points, shorthanded goals, and shots. He kept up his fiery standard of play when he got to Everett, logging 16 goals and 20 assists, totaling to 36 points in a span of 30 games. The 5'11, 190-pound center put up another 28 points in the playoffs. The 2018 trade season also saw the return of former Silvertip Spencer Gerth in exchange for a seventh round selection in the 2019 WHL Draft, and forward Bronson Sharp from the Portland Winterhawks in exchange for a fifth round selection in the 2020 WHL Draft. Gerth, a 6'3, 201-pound forward was traded to Victoria last season. The Tips also acquired Jameson Murray, a defenseman from the Calgary Hitmen, in exchange for a conditional sixth round selection in the 2019 or 2020 WHL Draft, and forward Ethan O'Rourke from the Prince George Cougars in exchange for forward Ethan Browne. Murray, a 6-foot-3, 183-pound defenseman, had six points in 28 games with Calgary this past season. O'Rourke, a 6-foot-5, 208 pound forward, posted five goals and nine assists with Prince George before his move to Everett where he finished the regular season with four more points. At the end of the season, members of the team acquired by trade had together posted 32 goals and 62 assists, proving the impact of their presence on the roster.

The Hart of the Team

This season proved yet again that nothing can slow down legendary goaltender Carter Hart. His resume grew even greater as he captured the World Juniors Championship gold with Team Canada in January. Coming off of last year's second-straight Goaltender of the Year award, Hart continued to defy all odds as he seamlessly persisted through yet another successful season, despite absence and illness. He had only 6 losses in his 41 regular season games played, and led his team's fight through the U.S. Division and to the top of the Western Conference. He broke his personal record save percentage for the fifth consecutive time with a .947 mark at the end of the regular season. Along with the 2017-18 Silvertips Community Relations Award, Hart received the 2017-18 Silvertips Most Valuable Player award for the third year in a row. In addition to being named winner of the 2017-18 Four Broncos Trophy (WHL Most Valuable Player), Hart became the first person in CHL history to win Goalie of the Year award twice. His leadership and capacity to take control of the ice from between the posts is a trait that will be dearly missed in Everett as he takes his career to the next level in the pros as a Philadelphia Flyers prospect.

The Leader in Dewar

Since he captured the Silvertips Rookie of the Year award following the 2015-16 season, Connor Dewar has not slowed down for a second. The 2017-18 alternate captain and relentless center out of The Pas, Manitoba, led his team in goals (38) as he became the youngest player in franchise history to reach the 38-goal mark. A result of his tough-as-nails work ethic and constant accountability, Dewar was named captain in June, which came as no surprise to anyone who had experienced his character on and off the ice. The 1999-born player has missed only five games in the span of his WHL career, totaling 116 points in 211 career games. Amidst a 5-2 deficit, his third-period goal against the Tri-City Americans in Game 6 of the Western Conference Championship sparked a three-goal rally by the Silvertips, the game eventually won by Kevin Davis' overtime power play goal for the second Western Conference title in franchise history. The Silvertips Most Dedicated Player award winner and 2018-19 captain is entering his first year of eligibility for the NHL Draft.

The Record-book Trio of 20's

A season with outstanding leadership is successful by nature. It was no coincidence that the 2017-18 Silvertips experienced a season full of history made and records broken. The beloved 1997-born trio consisting of Matt Fonteyne (LW), Patrick Bajkov (RW), and Kevin Davis (D), has been playing together since 2013. Since their debut, they have broken franchise records and led the team to many a victory while doing so. They are a decorated bunch, with 16 team awards between them over the past five seasons. As they hold the top three spots in all-time franchise games played (Davis, 347; Bajkov, 342; Fonteyne, 340), the experience of these three players led to an abundance of skill and rounded knowledge—more than deserving of all recognition they received.

Fonteyne (Wetaskiwin, AB) was the 2017-18 captain and an impactful leader on and off the ice. The left-shooting forward put up 88 points in the 2017-18 regular season with a staggering 270 shots on goal, and in January alone captured WHL Player of the Week and Player of the Month. With two goals in game three against Seattle in the first round of the playoffs, Fonteyne lifted his team to a win that would eventually help Everett capture the series. He came up second in points this season, behind Bajkov (Nanaimo, BC), who had a record-shattering year and now holds all-time franchise records in three categories: assists (176), points (288), and goals (112). The three-time Iron Man Award recipient and two-time leading scorer was a reliable skater who consistently put up points, with four hat tricks across the 2018 regular season and playoffs alone. The right-winger was named to the 2017-18 Western Conference All-Star Team (Second team) to close out his final regular season. Davis (Kamloops, BC), who made his presence known on the blueline, led his team in the plus/minus category this season with a rating of 29. The right-shooting defenseman played 71 games this season where he put up 65 points and broke the all-time franchise record for games played. He also capped the greatest comeback game in Silvertips history: a massive blast from center point for a game-winning power play goal in sudden-death overtime against the Tri-City Americans to capture the Western Conference Championship series. In historic fashion, each of the undrafted 20-year-olds signed a professional contract with an NHL team: Bajkov, Florida Panthers; Fonteyne, San Jose Sharks (AHL); and Davis, Colorado Avalanche (AHL).

2018-19 SEASON

The 16th season of Everett Silvertips hockey delivered the complexion of an afterglow of a memorable title run, and the demands to fill the holes left by those making an enormous impact. Amazingly, the Silvertips not only continued their trend since opening play of making the playoffs, but they answered every question chucked at them even through Thanksgiving, "where would they be by early April?" After answer that question with a resounding response and a Western Conference championship, the Silvertips hibernated for three short months of recuperation. While they were forced to weather the losses of Carter Hart, Patrick Bajkov, Kevin Davis, Matt Fonteyne, Garrett

Pilon, and Ondrej Vala (all gone pro), the Silvertips had key pieces in place to continue their run of excellence, without a snag: goaltender Dustin Wolf, newly minted captain Connor Dewar, Riley Sutter, and the emergence of forwards Bryce Kindopp and defensemen such as Wyatt Wylie and Gianni Fairbrother.

While 2017-18 provided turbulence in the early going and a soaring path come playoff time, the 2018-19 season under head coach Dennis Williams delivered little hangover from the end of May. The Silvertips sprinted again to 47 wins, 99 points, their third straight U.S. Division banner, WHL awards nominations, and several key figures in the hunt for the NHL Draft or development camp invites. With Hart set to take on new challenges as a 20-year old poised to strike for the Philadelphia Flyers starting goaltender position, Dustin Wolf left little doubt as to his rightful successor. On his way to earning Western Conference goaltender of the year honors, Wolf broke the Tips single season record for wins (41), led the WHL in save percentage (.936), and was second in shutouts (7) while also keeping a straight track with his studies and earning CHL Scholastic Player of the Year honors. While the Tips continued to tighten the defensive screws on the opposition (with a CHL low 1.9 goals against average per game), they also maintained an attacking philosophy with a league high 37 shots per game, while three Silvertips – Kindopp (39), Dewar (36), and Zack Andrusiak (38) each surpassed the 30-goal plateau. After the Tips wrapped up their seventh U.S. Division banner before a packed house in downtown Everett, they made quick work of the Tri-City Americans in five games while shattering a franchise playoff record for goals (9) in a game, eliminating Tri-City on home ice.

Despite dropping the first two games over an opening weekend speedbump, the Silvertips caught fire after a 3-1 win over Portland, closing a season-opening three-game, three-day series. The Tips then soared to win 16 of their next 21 games and lost in regulation at home just one more time until Jan. 11, all the way until after the trade deadline. In the loss of Carter Hart, Patrick Bajkov, Matt Fonteyne, and Kevin Davis, the Tips found more holes to fill. Dustin Wolf earned his second CHL Goaltender of the Week award by Christmas, and the Tips found contributions from all corners: veterans (the Tips were 16-3 in the first 19 games when Connor Dewar scored a goal), and rookies (Jackson Berezowski was the first Tips 16-year old to hit double digits in goals since Dewar, 2015-16). After the Tips cruised to the division title, an expected opening round fistfight with the division rival Tri-City Americans was a near one-sided affair. The Tips bolted out to a 2-0 series lead on home ice, before narrowly dropping game 3 in Tri-City, in overtime. A game four shutout by Dustin Wolf (first of his playoff career) got the Tips back on track and they wasted little time putting the Americans away on home ice, setting a franchise playoff record for most goals in a game, in a 9-1 victory which included Bryce Kindopp's first playoff hat trick. The Tips easily won the season series with Spokane, but unfortunately the run of success ended in the second round against the Chiefs, who caught fire before the end of the regular season. Spokane shockingly took the first two games in Everett and put the Tips into a 3-0 series hole before a textbook Tips victory, 4-1 in Game 4, kept their season alive. Needing a win to crank the pressure on the Chiefs with the last two potential games of the series set for downtown Everett, the Tips nearly pulled off another win, but had their season end in a 2-1 defeat – much of the final minute spent in the Spokane zone.

HUNGRY LIKE THE WOLF

Dustin Wolf's first season taking over for Carter Hart went without a hitch. The NHL Draft eligible goaltender escalated his workload, from 16 games during Hart's final season, to a near record-breaking 61 appearances the following year. That opened the door to a 41-win campaign, a new Silvertips record, along with a whopping seven shutouts during the season (not included: his first career playoff shutout, Game 4 in the first round, over Tri-City). Wolf would end up as WHL Western Conference Goaltender of the Year, a lock for WHL First Team All-Star, and eventually a draft selection by the Calgary Flames in the 2019 NHL Draft.

PITBULL ATTACK

Connor Dewar took over the reins as captain and in a fierce, pitbull like mentality, maintained a relentless approach to his game and the direction of the Silvertips. Coming back for his fourth season, Dewar led the Tips with 81 points in 59 games, and ranked second with 36 goals. He was the ultimate catalyst as well for the Tips: 10 times he scored the first goal of the game, leading the entire program. Eight of his goals were game winners (two in sudden death overtime). And five goals were scored as empty netters, in dagger-like fashion to finish off a hockey game. Not to mention, his primary assist on a Bryce Kindopp overtime winner, before the horn sounded, ended arguably the loudest OT victory in Tips history: a 1-0 win over Seattle before a sellout crowd on Mar. 2. The year was truly a relentless one for the Tips, led remarkably by their captain.

HOME SECURITY

There was no lapse in the defense. With key contributors maturing in age and a new, yet established voice on the blueline in assistant coach Louis Mass, the Silvertips continued to keep opponents under lock and key in their own zone. The Silvertips not only led the WHL, but the entire Canadian Hockey League with a microscopic low 1.9 goals-against-average per game. Their 26.9 shots allowed per game was only excavated by the Prince Albert Raiders (26.2), the eventual WHL champions. And while key defensive zone statistics such as takeaways, hits, and blocked shots aren't a recorded metric for nightly WHL box scores, the Tips blueline still demonstrated value at both ends of the ice. Seven Tips defensemen a +10 rating or higher (Jake Christiansen was the leader of the pack at +33) while for the first time in franchise history, three Tips blueliners surpassed the double digit goal plateau: Christiansen (12), Wyatt Wylie (11), and Gianni Fairbrother (10).

THANK YOU KHAIRA, ANDRUSIAK, MINULIN

While the Silvertips managed a roster with a unique state – all three of their overagers were imported via trades in the past year – they delivered unforgettable moments and a resume that heavily weighed into the Tips third straight U.S. Division title. Khaira and Minulin – both battling against the Tips for the Ed Chynoweth Cup just months prior – were remarkably brought over in trades from the Swift Current Broncos and were donning Silvertips green by Halloween. The towering duo, at 6-foot-2 or taller, combined for a +46 rating on the blueline while earning key minutes on Tips special teams. Andrusiak – an intriguing New Year's Day swap with the division rival Seattle Thunderbirds for Sean Richards – elevated the Tips scoring punch and finished a 38-goal, 64-point campaign by the end of the regular season and buried a pair of game winners in a Silvertips sweater.

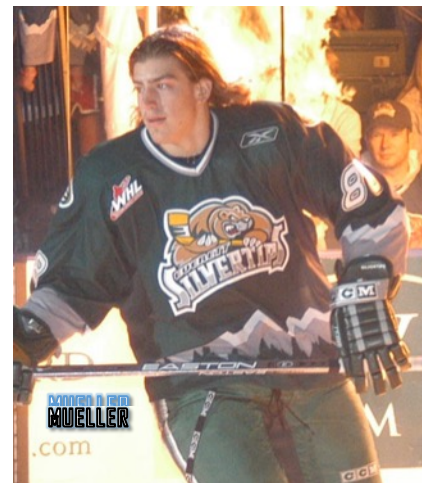
